Sandbags in Whitchurch!

It is Friday 10th January and it begins to look as if the level of the River has at last started to go down. Below the weir the level is still above the previous record high. There are pictures on the WoT web site where you will also find Nick Brazil's videos.

This morning there were worries that houses in Eastfield Lane might be threatened. We called for assistance from OCC and Stephen Trinder called for assistance from SODC. Within the hour OCC had delivered sandbags, SODC had sent a truck loaded with sandbags and Chris Softley from OCC Highways had arrived. Chris cleared a couple of drainage grids and those drains started to draw water away. By that stage we could see that although there were some enormous puddles only two houses had real problems. The Greyhound was also at some risk. Chris subsequently arranged for another fifty sandbags to divert water away from them

My concern now is that none of that water came from the High Street, very little was run off from the land nearby and none of the water on the Lane itself was flood water directly from the Thames. Most if not all of the water on the Lane was welling up from a single drain cover, and that was at the point where the underground culvert turns towards the River.

The other end of that culvert is a considerable distance above the weir beyond Aldridge's farm and is part of an extensive system that is said (probably?) to be Saxon in origin. It is covered by ancient rights and the flora and fauna in it are protected. From the Village's point of view the solution would be to find a way of diverting the water back into the River before it crosses the High Street.

It does seem that the we would need lengthy discussions with land owners and also with agencies that are not noted for accepting change of any sort.

Although some people in our Village have been badly affected others have had a much rougher time. Chris said he has been to villages before he got to us where the water was a metre deep. Similar depths have been reported for parts of Pangbourne.

Monitoring the River

For those interested, the Environment Agency has automated level sensors both above and below the lock that are updated every few hours. You can see them if you Google *River Levels* and work your way through the reference to the Environment Agency.

Cuts in Oxfordshire County Council Budgets

We are constantly being reminded by our County Councillor Kevin Bullmer that OCC has had its funding slashed heavily by the government. I think this will trickle down to SODC and then to us when we will find that to keep our Village as we like we will have just two choices. We can pay for the jobs to be done from Parish funds, which of course come back to our households as Council Tax. Or we can get the jobs done by our valiant volunteers.

Quite a lot happens already. I recently saw someone clearing a huge pile of leaves from the High Street just below Hartslock Bridleway. The "Cut" has been cleared. Some guerrilla gardening by Keith *the bandit* Brooks has greatly improved the bank opposite the Gallery. The benches on the High Street have been renovated, the phone box has had glass replaced and a coat of new red paint. That is just a few instances: the the list goes on.

All this is of course very ad hoc at the moment. It would be even more effective if it could be organised a little more formally. I am starting to look for a suitable scheme and would be pleased to hear from anyone who thinks they can help.

We would like to thank OWL and Woodcote Rally for buying the new rug for the library, the rug is bright and colourful and the children love to sit on it and listen to stories or join in with songs during Rhymetimes. Rhymetimes are on Thursday mornings from 10-10.30 and are led by Joanne Richards. Joanne is a volunteer, we are lucky to have her - she has a great voice and keeps us all on track. Thank you Joanne.

We are about to start our basic Computer course, an hour or so a week for six weeks. This course is run by an Age UK Volunteer, we are very grateful to John for coming in to organise the course. Thank you John.

The beginning of a new year seems a good time to remind people of what Woodcote Library has to offer: We have three public computer terminals with internet access, they are free to use. There is a small charge for printing, you can book a time to use them by phoning us on 01491 682323 or take a chance and just pop in. We also have a photocopier for public use, A4 copies are 10p each.

If you loose your bus pass you can complete a form and pay for a replacement bus pass at the library, the replacement cost is £10, the bus pass will be posted to you within 10 days.

We have a local history section, where you can find books and information about the Woodcote area. The local history section contains a transcipt of the St. Leonards parish register of births, marriages and deaths from 1846.

The library has DVDs to rent, prices range are from £1.25 to £3.50 per week. We have jigsaw and magazine swap boxes and we are a collection point for used stamps.

Lastly, but most importantly, we hold a stock of about 8000 books which we continually change and update - these are free to borrow for three weeks.

PANGBOURNE CHORAL SOCIETY TO SING MENDELSSOHN'S 'ELIJAH'.

On Saturday 15th February, Pangbourne Choral Society will open their 40th Anniversary season with a performance of Mendelssohn's *Elijah*. The concert will commence at 7.00pm at Falkland Islands Memorial Chapel, Pangbourne College.

Mendelssohn first performed *Elijah* in 1846 just two years before his death at age 38. The classical structure of the work looks back to Bach and Handel, whose music he loved, but is also infused with contemporary romantic feeling. Consequently, the story of the prophet and his confrontation with the priests of Baal is highly dramatic and punctuated by the reflective lyricism of Elijah's solo musings on the challenges he faces.

Jonathan Brown, PCS Music Director, will conduct the Southern Sinfonia and the four soloists are Claire Seaton (Soprano), Claire Williams (Mezzo Soprano) and, making their PCS debuts, Richard Coxon (Tenor) and Quentin Hayes (Baritone).

Comments Diana Smith, PCS Chairman, 'We're really looking forward to singing *Elijah*, for the first time in almost twenty years. To open our 40th Anniversary season with it is very special. Claire Seaton and Claire Williams have sung with us before to great acclaim. Both are highly respected and hugely experienced. Richard Coxon is a regular performer at the Royal Opera House, Glyndebourne Festival and the ENO. And Quentin Hayes has a well-deserved and much acclaimed reputation based on his international performances and his years as a Principal Artist with the Royal Opera House. We look forward to welcoming them both on debut.'

Pangbourne Choral Society gave its first performance back in 1974 under the baton of its founder, Ralph Allwood, and has flourished ever since. Thimble Mill

It was kindly pointed out to me that on the 1786 sketch of the river a mill is shown on the Pangbourne side named Thimble Mill. I have established that the small bridge over the Pang which we cross to get to the station is called Thimble Bridge.

My researches so far have revealed little else other than that there was a metal working establishment in that area. A thimble is not only the protective device used when sewing, but also the protective metal hoop (the eye) that fits inside a rope bent back on itself and spliced for mooring. It is also used in engineering to describe a ring, a tube, a sleeve, a bushing or ferrule.

According to Wikipedia the earliest known thimble, in the form of a simple ring, dates back to the Han Dynasty in China; 10^{th} century thimbles have been found in England and were in common use in the 14^{th} century. They were produced in Nuremberg in the 15^{th} century and in Holland in the 17^{th} . In 1693 a Dutch thimblemaker (Der Finger hüter) named John Lofting established a factory in Islington and then moved his mill to Buckinghamshire to take advantage of water powered production (the Pang used similarly?). He produced two million thimbles a year!

There must be more information out there?
