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CHAIRMAN'S REPORT, OCTOBER 2021

I hope you have been able to get out more during this post-lock down period to make the most of the glorious late summer weather we have been having. The Parish Council is now meeting faceto-face again at the Village Hall on the second Thursday of each month and members of the public are most welcome to attend.

Lower Narrows Pedestrian Safety Traffic Trial and Installation of Bollards – Consultation

- Oxfordshire County Council Highways (OCC) held a traffic trial at the lower narrows by the Ferryboat Inn on October 7th and 8th, which Cllr Diana Smith and TAPWG member Linda Gray observed. The goal was to evaluate different ways to address pedestrian safety by trying to prevent cars from mounting the pavement where there is no raised kerb. This normally only happens when two cars both enter the narrows at the same time with one vehicle using the pavement as a passing place, jeopardising the safety of pedestrians. OCC looked at two approaches:
 - 1. Seeing if there was sufficient space for bollards or other safety impediments to protect pedestrians on the pavement.
 - 2. Giving priority to traffic in one direction. They initially trialled priority for traffic from south to north moving away from the bridge as those coming from the bridge have a clearer view of the narrows and were less likely to proceed when other cars were in the narrows.
- The results of the trial with the bollards was successful. OCC 'lined out' the narrow section with cones and, after adjusting them in consultation with the Ferryboat landlord so to ensure delivery access, they agreed that would be possible to introduce bollards at the agreed locations, to provide improved safety for pedestrians. Based on this feedback, they have asked the Parish Council to confirm if we would like OCC to proceed with the installation of bollards at the narrows to protect pedestrians on the pavement.

- The results of the trial for giving priority to traffic in one direction were less clear. OCC's feedback was that it became apparent that the existing setup with Give Way signs on either end of the narrows, whilst slightly unconventional, does work well and to introduce a 'priority system' introduces an occasional annoyance for northbound drivers having to wait for southbound vehicles to clear before being able to proceed. They therefore recommended that the existing set-up is retained in its current form.
- The key result is that OCC are ready to go ahead with implementing bollards on this stretch of the road that will have a clear impact on improving pedestrian safety in the village. The priority traffic recommendation could be re-evaluated in the future with more extensive trials but would not have the same level of benefit to safety.
- They are offering us the option of "bendable" or "flexible" bollards that have the advantage of being able to withstand a certain amount of traffic damage and would not need to be replaced as frequently from damage. They are proposing to use traditional 'Manchester' style flexible bollards as shown in the photo below to be consistent with the Conservation Area and would be installed with Red/White banding between the top two gold bands for reflectivity. OCC marked the proposed locations of the bollards with white dots which can be seen in the street there are nine on the 'wall side' and six on the 'pub side' plus one to replace the existing bollard.



Informal consultation: The need to improve pedestrian safety at the lower narrows pavement has been overwhelmingly supported by residents in previous surveys including the 2019 Village Plan survey. High Street verge protection: The council voted to protect the grassy verge on the east side of the High Street between Duchess Close and Racquets by implementing several smaller white bollards/ posts. David Baty of TAPWG presented this to the council explaining that the verge had been previously damaged from parking and general traffic and that OCC advised that the posts would be of sufficient height and location to demark and protect the verge.

Hardwick Road Verges Project: I met with Sally Woolhouse and John Bradon along with an OCC representative on Hardwick Road to discuss the longstanding initiative to restore and protect the verges along Hardwick Road from the village entrance to Hardwick Estate. The verges are highly biodiverse and several sections have been increasingly eroded from traffic using makeshift passing places. The project would also try to ensure the passing places were fit for purpose including addressing any drainage issues, whilst reinstating the surrounding verge. OCC agreed to support the initiative in general and offered to provide technical and costing support. This would involve a third type of bollard/post at the passing places, but the project is still in the feasibility phase. WOTHabs has been working on a grant application for this project from the Network Rail funded "Mend the Gap" organisation who have indicated that this type of grant application is likely to be supported.

20mph in the Village: OCC Highways have confirmed that a program will be progressing to roll out 20mph speed limit in many built up areas in Oxfordshire and that Whitchurch-on-Thames is on the initial list of villages expressing interest in this. This initiative will drive the policy that "20mph is the new 30mph." The initial rollout would be to change the signs to 20 mph without adding any extra traffic calming measures to reduce speed where it may be needed to reach 20mph. This is still going through the OCC approval process and they have not been able to confirm the timings, but it looks promising, and we expect to hear more in the coming months. OCC

are likely to perform a speed survey for this in the village in early November.

Civil Parking Enforcement: You may have seen that the Civil Parking Enforcement (CPE) authority is on track to come into effect in South Oxfordshire in November being transferred from Thames Valley Police to OCC. It remains to be seen if this will have any impact on parking enforcement in our village given current street layouts and restrictions, but I know that ClIr Smith and TAPWG are working with OCC to see how this may enable us to get residents parking in certain areas in the village.

Heritage apple trees to be planted at the Polish Church Memorial

site: The Parish Council voted to support the idea of the Green Team and resident Alistair Dunstan of planting heritage apple trees in the Polish Church Memorial garden. Cllr Higley has published a related article in the Summer 2021 Bulletin that provides more details.

Thames Path signs: I met with Thames Path Manager Steven Tabbit in August to address a few issues in the village:

- He agreed to have the bent Thames Path sign at the toll booth fixed.
- He put some stickers with Thames Path arrows on the High Street to address the issues some residents mentioned about people going down Manor Road by mistake. I have more of these stickers if anyone thinks they are needed elsewhere.
- The need for caution signs by the steep dip at the Hartley Steps at the end of Hartslock Bridleway to ask cyclists to be careful of pedestrians to avoid conflict at that point. This is especially important with increased cyclists coming through for the first time on King Alfred's Way. The wording for this sign was agreed by the Council in September and Thames Path volunteers will be installing these in the near future.

buddleia and weeded around the chapel platform, as well as assisting at the installation of the commemorative cross. The Green Team have continued to prepare for the planting of a small number of heritage fruit trees in the south east corner as part of the proposed community orchard.

- Entrance of driveway to Walliscote House In mid September a working party led by Leslie Maynerd weeded and tidied the flower beds, and generally improved the site, removing unwanted growth. We completed the refurbishment of the bench which now commemorates both the donor Stan Remington and his wife 'Pockets'. A small ceremony was held in early October to mark this.
- North verges of Manor Road In mid October, a working party led by Martin Bengzen and Frances Dixon cleared several areas of the verges in preparation for mowing and for planting new ferns, etc., enhancing the appearance of this area.

We welcome all who would like to help with Green Team work. Our working parties last from an hour up to two or three, but you don't have to stay for the duration. In (say) half an hour or an hour you can still make a worthwhile contribution. If you would like to know more or have a suggestion for work we might undertake, please contact me (details on the website).

Our goals for the remainder of the year include:

- Find guardians for every green space in the village
- Engage and involve more people to help look after our green spaces
- Involve the school and pre-school more in Green Team work
- Complete the Polish Garden Project

THE GREEN TEAM

Since the last Bulletin, twelve working parties have been held and people throughout the village have, often unasked, contributed help with various tasks. Although the rate of plant growth slackened off as compared what we saw at the height of summer, there was still plenty to do. Some key points are indicated below.

- *List of Green Spaces* We are lucky to have many green spaces in the village; our primary goal is to care for these. The list can be found on our website page: https://whitchurchonthames.com/ groups/greenteam.html. Photos of the team at work appear in the Pictures section of the website.
- Village Green and the Maze. We have regular working parties maintaining these areas. We have edged and mowed the central area each month and in late July we liaised with the village contractors when they carried out their annual cut of areas around the maze, including the mound on the right-hand side of the entrance. Work on the village green has been mostly at the southern end where the Green Team have removed a cricket net that had fallen into disuse, cleared a large number of invasive plants and unwanted saplings, planted some cotoneaster shrubs at the entrance to the car park, and trimmed the beech hedge alongside the road and the holly hedge around the car park.

Active Travel: I met with the Pangbourne and Whitchurch Sustainability (PAWS) Active Travel group. They are looking at a number of pedestrian safety and cycling related initiatives that are primarily focussed on Pangbourne but also on access between Purley and Whitchurch. What they are doing fits well with our Pedestrian Safety and TAPWG activities. Some of the key things we can work with them on include:

- Pedestrian Safety including working with us to improve the narrow road and pavement access road to the bridge by the Boathouse surgery. Pangbourne Parish Council are also supportive of this activity.
- More bike racks on the High Street and also at the Whitchurch Village Hall
- Investigating options to improve cycling in the High Street where cars are parked and at narrow road junctions

New Councillor – I am sure that our newest councillor, Nick Brazil, will be no stranger to many in the village as he has been involved in community activities in the village for many years. This was the final open vacancy and the Parish Council now has a fill complement of 7 councillors.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR REPORT

What do Nando's, Greggs, McDonalds and South Oxfordshire District Council have in common? The answer, in case you hadn't worked it out, is that all have been affected by the sudden shortage of HGV drivers. The SODC service that has been hit by this issue is the waste service, as all our collection vehicles are HGV. Biffa, our contractor for this service, has been unable to provide the drivers needed when the normal drivers are either on holiday or self-isolating because of Covid. In the past, Biffa would use one of several agencies that provide temporary drivers, many of whom would be European. Following Brexit and then Covid and better wages back home in Europe, there are simply no drivers available.

Unlike Nando's or Greggs, our specialist vehicles cannot be replaced by smaller vehicles that don't need HGV licences to drive them, and we also have a regular pattern of services with thousands of expectant home owners looking for a collection on a particular day. This pattern of a regular service cannot be changed, as it's a certainty that a chaotic situation would develop before long that could take weeks to sort out.

So what has happened is that all Biffa staff, managers, supervisors etc that are available have been drafted in to support the service, and people have been working long days and weekends to keep things going. SODC is not the only council facing this problem, there are many others that are in a similar position.

At such times, difficult decisions have to be made; the garden waste service is not a statutory obligation, although users have to pay for it. Not everyone has a brown bin, but everyone has the grey and the green bin. And, if not collected, garden waste is rarely as unpleasant as other waste. If you have a brown bin, you usually have a garden and thus probably some space to put the garden waste to one side. This would not really be an option for the contents of the green, grey or food waste bins.

So, the tough decision was taken to go for the least worst option, and concentrate our resources on the most important forms of waste that everyone pays for through Council Tax.

This is the background, and I am pleased to say that many of you will have heard that the situation has eased, that the collections are resuming and payments are being re-arranged.

Was it a Summer of Discontent? Well, we didn't have hedgecuttings and lawn mowings piling up in the streets and I didn't see any rats, so not really a repeat of the winter of 1978-79. My thanks to everyone for being so tolerant and understanding of a situation that arose out

THE VILLAGE WALKS

In 1964 Eric Hartley and his family arrived in the village. In order to exercise their first yellow Labrador, Eric investigated and opened up the then mainly unused footpaths which are now used extensively as our local footpath network. The Hardwick Estate has also recently contributed by opening up a series of permissive paths to further enlarge our access. In 2007 the Whitchurch Society thought that an addition to the usual village activities might be acceptable.

Peter Smith (as its then Chairman) asked Eric Hartley if he would consider organising and leading a walk for the village on New Year's Day 2008. As many residents will remember it was very successful: over 100 walkers, including many children, and a number of dogs, turned out (Eric said that he felt like the Pied Piper of Hamelin as people emerged from every corner of the village). The success was such that he led a further series of walks at varying times of the year, some 27 in all, before he found himself increasingly unfit. The last walk he led in 2015, 'The Boundary Walk', was to define and follow, as near as possible, the ancient boundary of our two villages, Whitchurch and Whitchurch Hill.

Thereafter Roger Crawford, Richard Williams and I took over and we have organised and led a further 7 walks, all based on Eric's knowledge of our local footpath network and all described by him together with snippets of local historical information. The walks are generally based on the now detailed maps of our village footpath network. Eric originally wrote the Guide to the Walks about Whitchurch on Thames in 1980 and it has subsequently survived another five editions with some 2,000 copies produced. With the recent assistance of Robin Giddings the maps of the walks and the associated updated descriptions are now available on our village web-site. However, the number of participating walkers has sadly declined since the early days and it may now be time for others to take over the organisation of the village walks. The new arrivals in reception came with a mixture of excitement and nerves but all have settled in wonderfully with the help and support of the teaching team within the school.

Covid measures are still in place in the school setting, meaning we as the Parents' Association are having to find new ways to fundraise this coming year.

PANGBOURNE TRAIN SERVICE FROM DECEMBER 2021

GWR's Winter timetable comes into effect on 12th December 2021. The good news for us is that the weekday off-peak and Saturday trains at Pangbourne will return to a half-hourly frequency from that date, as it was before Covid. They are normally 8-coach trains and call at all stations from Didcot Parkway to Reading, also Twyford, Maidenhead, Slough, West Drayton, Hayes & Harlington, Ealing Broadway and London Paddington.

The Elizabeth Line (Crossrail) trains which currently run from Reading to Paddington mainline platforms will, sometime in the first half of 2022, start running through the new Paddington low-level platforms to Bond Street, Tottenham Court Road, Farringdon, Liverpool Street and on to Abbey Wood in south east London.

Looking west, a development plan has been agreed for Oxford station and the surrounding area. Electrification will be incorporated

into the project, along with the line from Didcot. Only then will our local Electrostar trains run to and from Oxford instead of Didcot Parkway. This is still several years away.

On the main line, the technical problems with the Hitachi Intercity Express Trains (cracks in the aluminium underframe) are still unresolved, so fewer long distance trains are running than originally planned. Some of our local Electrostar trains are being used to deputise: other train operators have lent GWR their Electrostars (the different coloured ones) to fill in.
