


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PARISH COUNCIL CHAIR'S UPDATE – OCTOBER 2023

With Summer over it's back to school and work and things are getting busy around the village. We have the Arts and Crafts Fair to look forward to and I'm glad to see the Greyhound back to selling food whilst they sort out the licensing with SODC.

High Street Residents' Parking and Pedestrian Safety Plan Consultation - OCC Highways have confirmed that consultation on the planned Residents' Parking scheme and changes to parking restrictions on the High Street is due to start on the 20th of October

- Consultation will last for four weeks.
- Documents will be published in January and the matter will probably go to the Cabinet Decisions Meeting at the end of January. Representatives of the PC can speak at the Meeting.

Speed Watch Village Signs – You may have seen some other villages using yellow Speedwatch signs alerting drivers that they may be subject to Speedwatch cameras. This seems like a good idea to make drivers more aware of the speed limit and help reduce speeding, so we will be doing the same shortly at the three entrances to our village. On average, 40% of people monitored in a Speedwatch session are speeding – not the majority but we are only managing one monitoring sessions, a week, so not a large sample. We need more volunteers. We may consider having a smiley/angry face once we have a year's worth of data.

The Walled Garden House – I wanted to comment on SODC's decision to approve this application as a number of residents objected to it and the size and height of the new house will be very visible and have a significant impact on the village Conservation Area. I attended the SODC Planning Committee meeting on 11th October to present our objections with support from Cllr Paul O'Grady and another resident in attendance to raise their own concerns. Despite us having what I felt was a strong planning basis for having the Walled Garden planning application, I am sorry to report that the SODC Planning Committee voted to approve the application, as recommended by the Planning Officer:

- The Planning Officer recommended approval stating the impact on the Conservation Area was neutral. He acknowledged that the new building would be much more visible from many angles, but felt it was offset by the improved architecture that was sympathetic to the area, compared to the existing building.
- 7 out of 11 SODC Councillors voted to approve the application, arguing that:
 - The plot was large and the house was not disproportionate to the size of the plot.
 - Whilst the third-floor roof was visible over the wall, overlooking would not be possible from the rooms there as they formed part of the dormer roof that only had Velux windows.
 - Some felt that it was not out of keeping with the Conservation area which was a built-up area with buildings of diverse architecture.
 - Others felt the applicants would be successful in an appeal. Even if rejected, other applications, perhaps for multiple houses would likely be accepted.
- The councillors understood our concerns regarding the pond and flooding and, that resolving these was a condition for development. I intend to push this with their Drainage and Flooding Engineer to ensure we get satisfaction on the pond being fully reinstated prior to any work on the house starting.

Conservation Area Assessment – Cllr Higley has been told that SODC is completing their review of a formal document defining the village Conservation Area and this should be available for public consultation by the end of the year.

Eastfield House redevelopment is already approved and in progress, but I also wanted to share the latest update as this also has a significant impact on the village. I have had feedback that the contractors are very conscientious of neighbours and keep the surrounding area generally clean, although are unavoidably a bit noisy during working hours. Please also note that Urban Villages has changed its name to Zephyr X due to an internal company restructuring.

Progress as of early October:

- The bat licence works were completed in September.
- You can see that they installed improved secure fencing around the site perimeter.
- They have stripped the property including all asbestos with just the last small rear section of the building to be removed.
- They have re-surveyed the trees in consultation with SODC and are just finalising the revised landscape design for SODC approval based on changes to growth of trees since the original survey. Some trees in the original tree survey showed trees that are now mature and worth keeping being removed and trees that are now dead as remaining.

Plans for next quarter include:

- · Concluding demolition of rear building
- · Progression of the utility trenches and drainage tanks
- · Repair work to the existing building
- · Commencement of the groundworks





Tea Hut Demolition – The Parish Council and the Cricket Club are in discussions regarding the demolition of the tea hut. Both agree that it is dangerous and beyond use in its current state. The PC has approved a motion to pay for the demolition subject to getting cost estimates. Removal of the existing tea hut would clear the way for the PC to develop a similar replacement building that could be used for Fetes and other community activities on the Village Green.

First Aid Course – A grant has been approved to fund a first aid course aimed at rescuing people on the river who may be based on a boat, and also training other general scenarios that could occur in the village. It is planned for the weekend of 13–14 January. Numbers will be limited, but I would like to encourage everyone in the community to consider signing up for the course. We would like those who have taken the course to consider acting as contacts in the Emergency Plan if urgent first aid was needed by other people in the village prior to the arrival of medical professionals. FixMyStreet Super User - I have signed up to be a FixMyStreet Super User and have received training. This means:

- I can identify potholes in the village pavements or streets, outline them with white paint and have them actioned by OCC Highways within 28 days. If it is considered a safety issue, I can request action within two hours.
- Qualifying potholes must be at least 4 cm deep and no more than two meters in length.
- Drains cleaning is no longer part of the Super User remit, but I have been
 put in touch with the area OCC Highways manager and will be able to
 discuss OCC work to address blocked drains.
- Please feel free to contact me if you become aware of any potholes in the village!

The Parish Council has been working to address a number of issues that residents have alerted us to:

- Hillside dangerous step fixed This was escalated to OCC Highways as a safety related issue and was prioritised and repaired.
- Whitchurch Hill bench A resident would like to donate a bench for the public to use part way up Whitchurch Hill, particularly for those who may want a rest attending Remembrance Sunday ceremonies. We have agreed a location with the OCC Countryside Officer and are hopeful for getting this in place ahead of this year's ceremonies.

New Councillor – We are pleased to welcome Debbie Leach to the Parish Council as our new Councillor. You will probably know Debbie as she is married to Rev. James Leach of St Mary's and is already involved in many aspects of village life. She has volunteered to be part of a new committee looking at improvements to the Manor Road Playground.

FROM YOUR DISTRICT COUNSELLOR

One of the proud boasts of South Oxfordshire is that it's in the very top ranks of the recycling league table, having the second highest rate of waste recycling in the country for the last two years. While brown bins of garden waste contribute a significant amount of the recycled waste, it's mainly down to the efforts of all the residents. Perhaps having just three basic bins, the green recycling bin, the black bin and the little food caddy makes it easy. However, there can still be a problem if someone puts the wrong stuff in the green recycling bin, such as a mass of food waste or used nappies, which can result in the whole truck load of what should be recycled stuff being condemned to be burnt at Ardley. It was shocking to read in the Henley Standard that a lazy bin man emptied a food waste bin into a resident's green recycling bin. This was then emptied into the paper etc recycling truck. Luckily, it was caught on camera by a resident's door-bell camera, and the bin man, who was an agency person working for Biffa, was duly dismissed.

We all have had stickers recently put on our bins about recycling, not least because the SODC recycling rate while good, has not improved significantly recently, and the council is keen to continue to be a leader on this issue. Last year, 11% of the items in the recycling bin were not actually recyclable, so please check before you chuck. I don't think the 3,340 tons that this 11% represents can all be the work of this one rogue bin man!

Some services, like the waste collection, are contacted out to contractors who can provide expertise and economies of scale, for example for buying equipment or using staffing agencies, which would be difficult to match with a relatively small and tightly run council like SODC, even though we can combine with the Vale of White Horse to have greater power. Many of the arrangements with contractors have built-in inflation escalation clauses to allow for revised payments without having to renegotiate everything. A recent Joint Scrutiny Committee with the Vale examined the contract we have with SABA to provide the car-parking service and noted that the contractor had been paid more each year, as below, in line with the contract. When challenged about some aspects of poor performance, SABA said they had difficulty recruiting, but Councillors looked at recent advertisements for staff that they had placed and found that they were paying less than comparable employers, and below the Real Living Wage.

STOP, LOOK AND SEE: PART TWO

If you followed Quiz one, in the last edition of the Bulletin, you will have reached the High Street. Before you continue, turn around and look at the Bell-mouthed entrance which indicates an entrance to an important house and complex. In this case, to the old Manor House (now Walliscote House) and the Church together with the Mill – our village of the past.

Q1: Why do we have two village churches?

Now proceed up the High Street and try to visualise the elm trees which once lined the road, some of which were used to secure the chains of miscreants who could be pilloried as the congregation attended Church for Sunday morning worship. I think the village stocks were also hereabouts.

Once again, there is a significant brick wall lining the pavement. Brick and flint (and tiles) define our village walls and structures. It is easy to see the availability of flint but brick and tiles?

Q2: Where is the local source?

We reach yet another bell-mouthed entrance – Manor Road, indicating that it too led to an important house (now Coombe Park) and Lower Lodge still sits on guard. I intend to take you to the site of the Polish Church, but not on this occasion.

Walk past the entrance to Barn Cottages – I remember it as the location of the Village Tithe Barn which burnt down thus allowing the present row of houses to be built.

Q3: What was or is a "tithe"?

So continue up towards the Art Gallery (this was the Village Shop which supplied all our grocery needs together with the occasional bottle of wine). Note the gratings in the pavement of adjacent walls of the cottages and the Gallery.

Q4: What was their purpose?

Once again visualise another two alehouses; White Hart Cottage alongside you and the impressive Wellesley House immediately opposite.

Q5: Why so many?

Turn right into Hardwick Road.

Q6: What are its other names?

Walk along the road just past Whiteways; you can turn onto the parallel dirt track on your left which will lead you to the Schoolhouse and the Old School.

Q7: Why was that school closed?

I wonder whether this track was the original village road since a slight right of way runs parallel to the tarmac road below.

The houses on Hillside were built on the site of Victorian houses and there is still one remaining. You can continue along their frontage until I want you to drop down to the Allotment footpath (Muddy Lane).

This lane will take you past or into The Maze.

O8: Whose idea allowed it to be built and who built it?

Then the Allotments (once again, sensibly and necessarily in use). The other village pride is the acquisition of the Cricket Ground and the provision of our Village Green.

And so back to Eastfield Lane, the Village School and Pre-School – why did they have to be provided?

The arrival of young families in Manor Road and Swanston Field brought about the need for, and then construction of, our splendid Village School and Pre-School

Answers at the end of this Bulletin.

Next Quiz – perhaps Hardwick Road to the new green western gates and Sheepwash Lane or onto the eastern gates and our boundary with Mapledurham, or Manor Road to the Polish Church or half way up the hill to the War Memorial and the back down to the bridle road (The Thames Path) via the Hartley Steps to reach and note our western boundary with Goring.

Drinkable Rivers Visit

They are part of an emergent movement that sees citizens who love the natural world claiming responsibility for its health, instead of relying on the word of corporations who profit from the status quo of our declining riparian environment. Members of Hardwick were there to participate in the water testing, with the hope to set up a similar routine, testing the Thames for both human and agricultural waste pollution.

Magdalen College Barge Restoration

The Swan at Streatley recently auctioned off its Magdalen Barge – one of the last remaining ferro-concrete hulled vessels in the country – due to increasing high costs and inflation.





The Barge is one of only five remaining barges from the original 23 - this one survives

because of its ferro-cement hull, groundbreaking in its time, and this hull is still completely sound, surviving the test of time! The sides need work but much of the original superstructure is solid and repairable according to buyer Paul Austin-Clark, who will be restoring the barge at Hardwick.

Paul is asking people to donate anything they can to 'float the boat', however, those who are able to pay a donation of £200 or more will be allocated a full day of hosted Magdalen College Barge activities.

STOP LOOK & SEE: ANSWERS

- Q1: The parishioners from up the Hill found difficulty in getting to Church, which was overcrowded by weekend newcomers, and they were berated by the village Priest, so land was provided for an additional Church and graveyard up the Hill.
- **Q2:** The appropriately named Tilehurst with its bed of clay and similarly at Woodcote (Potkiln Lane).
- **Q3:** A tithe is a tenth and it was a required annual payment of goods or produce to the Lord of the Manor in lieu of rent.
- **Q4:** These grills were for the delivery of fuel (coal?).
- **Q5:** Until 1479, Whitchurch was the hub of local transport. The numerous carters and carriers toiled hard (literally up and down hill) and needed to slake their thirsts. The water was unsafe to drink, so they drank "small beer" which is beer diluted with water, using the alcohol to reduce the risk posed by the water.
- **Q6:** Hardwick Road is also part of the "Tuddingway" (the Saxon supply route from Reading to Goring and on to Tudda's "ing" the area under his control at Crowmarsh Gifford. Its other more recent name is that it is part of the King Alfred 350km cycle route from Winchester back to Winchester (we are about half way).
- **Q7:** There were insufficient young children in the village they went up to Langtree School for both their primary and secondary education.
- **Q8:** Nick Brazil was the instigator and Peter Woolhouse the bricklayer.
