What a summer! But now the days are shortening, the schools are back and the Village fête is just a very happy memory. It is still warm enough for that stroll in the evening sunshine and there are some cricket matches still to come. Spectators are welcome: the fixture list is on the web site.

There are many reports in this issue and I will try not to duplicate. But there are a few things I must mention. Firstly, of course, the big event before us is the closure of the bridge. A lot of thinking and effort has gone into attempts to minimise its impact, but the problem is so simple that there are no easy solutions.

It is essential to keep a way through the Village right down to the footbridge and imperative that vehicles can turn round. Hence there will be double yellow lines south of Eastfield Lane. Otherwise no one is going anywhere. So if you are in Pangbourne and wish to be picked up use your mobile phone so that the driver does not have to wait.

Any extension of parking restriction that becomes necessary will be announced on the web site. Details of the Surgery on Tuesday afternoons appears elsewhere in this issue and on the web site.

When shopping in Pangbourne it is always worth asking if goods can be delivered. Some shops already do this and have indicated that they will continue to do so. Prescriptions can be delivered to home addresses by arrangement with your usual chemist.

Current information is that Streatley High Street will also have temporary double yellow lines. Very tough on the residents there but it should make everyone else's life a lot easier

And now, times they be a changing! John Barker's herd of Rare Breed White Park cows and his battered pick-up have been part of our Village scene for many years. John has at last decided that the time has come for him to do other things. End of an era: they will be greatly missed.

On the flip side of the coin, for the second time an Inspector has ridden rough shod over the wishes of the community, the Parish Council, the SODC planning Officers and the elected Planning Committee of SODC and decided that the Eastfield House development can go ahead.

The Village Green Management Group is now led by Harvey Ainley. A fund for a new pavilion now exists, which was given a kick start when Lucy Worsley donated the proceeds from her talk to it.

Although this may be a longer term project we have shifted the Earth in the past and we can do it again.

Finally, please start thinking *now* about the Art and Crafts Exhibition in November. It is *now* that you will take that amazing photograph or get that project with the wow factor really moving once again.

Footnote: Concerning the Eastfield House planning application

Speaking in general terms developers sometimes remind a planning department about legal costs when an appeal goes against it as pressure towards planning permission and I mentioned this in my comments about the Eastfield House application in the July Bulletin. Roger Pratap has written to me strongly denying that his organisation would behave in this way. Here is his letter:

The reality is that the planning system allows for costs to be claimed, but Majesticare has elected not to pursue. Our appeal statement says "As to the matter of costs referred to in the Grounds of Appeal, the Appellants advise us that it is not their wish to pursue this matter. Having considered all of the above the Council might not unreasonably expect an application for costs. However our instructions are that whilst the Appellant does not consider that the LPA's rejection to be remotely reasonable they recognise the need to work with the LPA in the future and therefore has decided as a matter of goodwill not to make an application. That should not however be taken to demur from the proposition that this is a good scheme which should never have been refused, and the Appellant would respectfully invite you to allow the appeal."

Autumn walk 2013

This year we will visit the site of the Roman Villa dig at Gatehampton. It will be possible to walk there and back, to go or return by train or to drive (there is parking space adjacent to the dig).

The dig is available for us on Sunday 6 October and I suggest that we leave a little later than usual (say 12:30 hrs. opposite the Art Gallery) and thus allow those who attend church beforehand to join us. (Bring a drink and a packed lunch?).

It is $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles and will take us just under an hour. Keep your eyes open en-route, not only are there some magnificent views across the valley and down to the river but the area is steeped in history.

We follow our ancient Tuddingway with a view of Coombe Park on our left and just before the steps we pass the drop to Hartslock Cottage. The Cottage featured in the 1991 Michael Palin film 'American Friends" (I now have the DVD). Nearby a grave was discovered with the bodies of two men side by side (one with coins in his mouth [a Roman burial?]). The area was also the scene of a tragedy; in July 1877 a young Gaiety Girl drowned herself.

As we reach the top of the rise there is a quarry on our left (look out for it on your train journeys from the west). This was extensively quarried for materials for the building programmes of Henry 1 and Henry 111. All the chalk was taken out by river!

Just before we emerge from Lower Hartslock Wood we pass a WW2 pillbox – part of the river defensive system against invasion.

Our path leads straight on to Gatehampton – not only one of the lost villages of Oxfordshire but the site of Neolithic, Bronze Age, Roman and Saxon occupation.

The site we are to visit is very big and has been under investigation for many years; we have been invited to see the section recently exposed.

My apologies – in a recent article I added 10 years onto the life of each of our estates! Manor Road was built in the 1950s and Swanston Field in the 1960s (I should have known - we moved here in 1964).

Re: Whitchurch on Thames bridge closure – Bus service 142

The planned closure of Whitchurch Toll Bridge for reconstruction works is now progressing towards the commencement stages. I have been advised that the closure is planned to take place from late September / early October 2013 until mid-April 2014. This will affect service 142 which links Woodcote and Whitchurch with Pangbourne and Reading.

During previous closures in the area this service has been altered to provide a circular operation. In the morning buses run direct from Reading to Checkendon via the A4074, returning via Exlade Street, Goring Heath (Post Office), Woodcote, Crays Pond thence Hill Bottom and Whitchurch-on-Thames, to reverse at Manor Road. They will then return direct to Crays Pond and follow the diversion via Goring, Streatley and Lower Basildon to Pangbourne. From here they will then follow the normal route to Reading.

In the afternoon, the above is operated in the reverse direction (i.e. Clockwise), outwards via Pangbourne and Goring to Crays Pond and again serve Hill Bottom on route to Whitchurch-on-Thames. They will then continue to Woodcote, Goring Heath, Exlade Street (not all journeys serve the latter two points) or direct to Checkendon from where they continue directly back into Reading via the A4074.

This will mean an extension of journey times via the diverted route, although there are also options for a faster run to/from Reading at certain times by travelling round the loop via Checkendon. In particular the first bus into Reading has had to be retimed to run some 15 minutes earlier from points such as Whitchurch Hill to enable it to reach Reading at an appropriate time but this is still a few minutes later arriving than at present. It was felt that passengers would not wish to get up any earlier!

Report from the Boathouse Surgery in Pangbourne

The Boathouse Surgery will ensure that a good service is provided for all our patients in Oxfordshire during the 7 months when the bridge is closed and when Pangbourne is only accessible to Whitchurch and Whitchurch Hill by the temporary footbridge or by driving round using the bridge in Goring.

We would encourage patients to come to the surgery during this period either by car or using the footbridge as then they will still be able to access the full range of services in the surgery.

To accommodate those patients who may find this difficult Dr Oppenheimer, Dr Keast and Dr Woolley will undertake (in rotation) a clinic in the Whitchurch Village Hall every Tuesday morning to see patients registered with any of the doctors at the Boathouse Surgery. There will also be a phlebotomist available to do blood tests. It is not practical to provide one of our nurses as so much of what the nurses do requires a sterile environment and/or equipment which cannot be achieved at, or taken to, the Village Hall.

Direct access is being arranged to patient computer records at the Boathouse Surgery so that the doctors will have full access to these in the Village Hall. An examination couch will be provided.

Appointments at the Whitchurch Village Hall will need to be made as usual at the surgery. We will also have appointments available on the day as we have at present in the surgery. It is not possible at the moment to estimate how many people will use this service. If it is very popular it may be possible to offer more appointments. However we would like to encourage our patients to continue to use the surgery in preference as it is much easier for us to provide the high standards of care that we aim to give at our normal premises.

The district nurses and GPs will continue to visit the housebound and those at Eastfield House. The doctors recognise that they may have to make a few more visits than usual and will have a car on the Whitchurch side of the river so that it will be possible for all the partners to see their patients at home when required.

We have investigated the possibility of patients collecting their drugs from the Village Hall but unfortunately this will not be possible. One of our dispensers already delivers medication for housebound patients and this will continue. Prescriptions will continue to be dispensed at the Boathouse Surgery for Oxfordshire patients who are on our dispensing list and are resident in Whitchurch Hill and beyond. All patients resident in Whitchurch need to use their usual chemist. Arrangements can be made with some chemists for home delivery of regular items.

We will of course keep this new outreach service under review and hope to adapt and improve the service provided when we understand more about what the needs of our patients are. Please let us know about any problems or concerns that you have.

As part of his role he will be focusing on community safety for local residents whilst they are in their homes or whilst travelling. Marcus said "I love working in such a lovely part of Oxfordshire and am lucky to have such a great team of Fire fighters".

Marcus and all the crew at Goring would like to remind everyone about the following things;

Smoke Alarms

Smoke alarms raise the alarm early, giving everyone time to deal with the situation before it becomes a fire or in the event of a larger fire - gives everyone the chance to get out, get the fire service out and stay out. They should be tested every week.

Escape Plan

Would you and your family know what to do if you had a fire in your home tonight? It can be difficult to think clearly in an emergency, make sure you have an escape plan which covers where to leave your keys, choosing your quickest safest route out of the house and ensuring you practice your plan to make sure it works.

Bedtime routine

Always ensure all naked flames and smoking materials are extinguished before bedtime.

Close all inside doors to stop a fire and smoke from spreading.

Never leave the washing machine, tumble dryer or dishwasher running overnight.

Whitchurch Bridge Closure

During the Whitchurch Bridge Closure between October 2013 and April2014 residents should continue to follow the advice above.

Crews will still attend from surrounding stations in Oxfordshire including Wallingford and Henley as normal. Our Neighbouring Fire and Rescue in Royal Berkshire will continue to support incidents in the Whitchurch/Woodcote area by providing fire appliances from Caversham Road Station in the North area of Reading.

I would like to add that we will also have an additional response vehicle at Goring fire station to support incidents during the period of the bridge closure which will help ensure emergency response to incidents near the Whitchurch area.

Oxfordshire County Councils Fire and Rescue Service are continuing to liaise with Oxfordshire Highways to ensure that services will not be affected.

I will also be holding some information days in the Whitchurch area to reassure residents of any concerns they may have. I have contacted local schools and will be using the email contacts they have (for parents and carers) to help spread that message.

the final against Wokingham on the 1st September.

We believe it's about getting the players playing in cricket matches, this year we have played 53 games and this does not include our practice matches on a Saturday morning or extra tournaments we have entered. We are not a club that focuses on winning cricket matches, we focus on having fun and working hard and as a by product of this we have been very successful. This is not just because we have good teams, it's because we teach the players it is more than 11 individuals in a game of cricket, it's about working together as a team as that's what makes you successful at cricket and life.

We have also the distinction of being one of the highest qualified coach to player ratio clubs in Berkshire with current training session running to a 1 to 4/5 coach to player ratio, we feel as a club that if you want to develop all players we feel you need to be in groups that enable you to develop everyone's talent to the highest ability they can achieve. 
