

TALES FROM THE FAR SIDE

Moose McGregor's Unlikely Legacy

The little Namibian settlement of Solitaire (current population 92) sits on a t-junction in the middle of the Namib Desert. As well as a few houses, it consists of some fuel pumps, a small guest/lodge and, one of Namibia's most bizarre surprises, an excellent bakery. Founded by a Scotsman called Moose McGregor, this establishment makes the best apple pie I have ever tasted in my life. How this is done in a country and climate so hostile to growing the apples needed for this culinary delicacy remains a mystery. But all hail to the late Mr McGregor for bequeathing this most unlikely but delicious legacy to his adopted African home.

There is one further surreal touch to Solitaire which fascinates and delights visitors. Its entrance is guarded by the shells and skeletons of ancient vehicles from a pre-war saloon to a Fordson tractor impaled on a large cactus. So my advice is that if you are travelling between Sossusvlei's dunes and Walvis Bay do not just turn left at Solitaire but stop and sample its unique culinary and visual delights.

THE WHITCHURCH SOCIETY – Autumn Walk Sunday 18 October, 2015

As I expect most people will know by now, after organising 27 village walks since January 2008, Eric has decided to pass on the responsibility to someone else. Roger Crawford, Richard Williams and I have agreed to organise the walks in future, and the first of these will be an Autumn walk of about $6^{1}/_{2}$ miles (or about 5 miles for the shorter alternative) on Sunday 18 October leaving The Greyhound at 10.30 am. We have based the walk on one designed by Eric in 2011. Note the slightly earlier starting time than usual. We should allow a bit more than 2 hours for the longer route.

We have tried to find a route which will take us through woodland, where, hopefully we shall be able to admire the Autumn colours. We thought it would be appropriate to incorporate the Hartley Steps into the route and we plan to go from there along the Thames Path and through the Hartslock Woods to the Nature Reserve. We shall pause here to admire the view of the Goring Gap and the Brunel Bridge, after which, if we are following the shorter route we shall turn right to Combe End Farm, pass through Beech Wood (where we meet those following the longer route), then walk alongside Stoneycroft Plantation to the War Memorial.

If we are following the longer route, after the Nature Reserve we turn left to Upper Gatehampton Farm. From there we walk through Great Chalk Wood to Blackbird's Bottom, and then down through the Beech Wood, where we meet those on the shorter route.

We should get back to The Greyhound by about 1.00pm where Nick, the new landlord, will welcome us for some well-earned refreshment.
