

FROM THE CHAIRMAN OF THE PARISH COUNCIL

The weather is certainly improving now as we hit temperatures in double figures and daffodils and blossom have started to appear. Consequently the village green has had a haircut as we are getting ready for the cricket, football and other events to be held on this very important resource. One of these will be held on the 19th May to celebrate the Royal Wedding. These are always great social events where the village gets together to enjoy the proceedings and renew friendships. This time we will have the Roy Bailey Big Band entertaining us so come along and listen to the music and enjoy the tea and share your cakes and biscuits, with any proceeds going to the pre-school. I am aware that there are problems in the High Street with parking, speeding, erosion of verges, potholes and blocked drains and I want to assure you that your Parish Council is doing everything it can to address these by working with OCC, SODC and Thames Valley Police. We have TAPAG (Traffic and Pavements Advisory Group) who are arranging for traffic monitoring and discussing verge erosion prevention measures and parking with OCC and our PCSO Mark Bell. The blocked drains and gulleys and pot holes have been

recorded on Fix My Street which is the official way to report street problems to OCC Highways and we are constantly monitoring the outcomes.

The Village Plan is progressing and we have two important events which everyone should take a great interest in – we are relying on your views to guide us as to how you want your village to be in the future and what is important to you in this regard. They are on Saturday May 12th Village Hall, 10:30 – 1:30pm and Saturday 19th May at the Art Cafe, 10 – 12:30pm.

WHITCHURCH BRIDGE: PANGBOURNE APPROACH ROAD

Our engineering consultants Peter Brett Associates (PBA) have completed their pre-application discussions with West Berkshire Council (WBC) on our proposals for widening the Pangbourne approach road, and we have now received WBC's formal Pre-application Advice. WBC conclude that:

“The works are proposed in order to bring about benefits in terms of highway safety and these will need to be supported by sound justification. It is clear that there may be a conflict between preserving the setting of the listed building and the visual impact of the works in terms of the loss of trees and the interests of improving highway safety. Therefore I am unable to indicate the likelihood of success for an application for these works, but would encourage you to consider any possibilities for limiting the works to trees, instating additional landscaping and any other measures for minimising the visual impacts of the works.”

Because of the cost and Planning risks and costs associated with option C2 it may be some time before we are ready to proceed. However, we are making good progress with the detailed design of our proposed traffic calming scheme (as reported in the January Bulletin) to give a clear and continuous 20mph speed limit from the Toll Booth, over the Bridge and along Whitchurch Road into

Pangbourne. The scheme will include reactive “Slow Down” signs and we hope to complete the works by this autumn.

WHITCHURCH ON THAMES CRICKET CLUB

Did you know that cricket was first recorded as being played in the village in 1879. That’s nearly 140 years ago. It’s been an integral part of Whitchurch village life since the early 1920’s when the field (as it was then) at the bottom of Eastfield Lane, was purchased by Mr A.R. Whitelock, a local resident (Indeed his son, Miles, was Club President for many years until his recent, sad death). He made it available to the Cricket Club, which at that time had no ground or kit , a pitch was prepared by hand, and a series of fixtures arranged against local teams; Pangbourne, Goring, Streatley and Woodcote. Gradually the fixture list expanded to include Wallingford, Thatcham and Caversham – much larger and more prosperous clubs than Whitchurch. But Whitchurch held its own and all the larger clubs wanted a fixture with us on our lovely ground.

Cricket ceased to be played there during the Second World War and the ground and hedges were used for practice by Canadian tanks (amongst others). It restarted shortly after the end of the war and has continued to be played there until the present day. The club has a full fixture list from late April to early October and an active playing base of around 30 people drawn from in and around the village mostly. We play “friendly” fixtures and welcome players of all ages, genders and abilities. We particularly try to encourage young local players to participate and try and ensure that they participate as fully as possible during the matches.

WoTHABS: CONSERVATION AND REGENERATION

White-Letter Hairstreak Butterfly and Elm Trees

Two specimens of a variety of elm, *Ulmus minor* 'Ademuz', highly resistant to Dutch Elm disease, have been planted at Whitchurch Maze. When they become established, these new elms will provide the food plant which is essential for the White Letter Hairstreak caterpillars.

This is part of a project led by Peter Cuss from Butterfly Conservation, to regenerate habitat for the butterfly, following his finding in January of some of its eggs on one of the Wych Elms at the Maze. The butterfly's numbers took a nosedive when so many elms were lost through disease in the 1970s.

The life cycle of this butterfly is interesting. The eggs are laid singly on the terminal buds of the tree in late summer and then they overwinter for nearly eight months before hatching in early spring. The caterpillars eat the flower buds, then the leaf buds and finally the leaves, before pupating and then hatching in June.

We hope that on sunny days in June to August we will be lucky enough to see some adult butterflies on the wing, high in the tree canopy, confirming that Whitchurch is indeed a haven for this rare delicate beauty.

A Corridor for Wildlife

Here is an update on the recent reduction to hedge height of the line of beech trees near the school.

A small working party has now strengthened the line of the hedge by using some of the cut brushwood across the gaps. It is hoped this will both allow the healthy growth of new shoots to fill those gaps and in due course encourage wildlife. We have left several openings for going in and out, and are optimistic that the children will understand the value of helping us regenerate areas of habitat for wildlife. At home time the schoolchildren who stopped by to help us showed great interest in what we were doing and why.
