Success! We now have over 80 per cent of the dwellings in our Village who are using SmartWater. The three new signs will put up at the entrances to the Village as soon as we have Planning and Highways approval.

I would like to record a big "thank you " for all the effort put in by our local policeman Mark Bell, and of course to all the volunteers who distributed leaflets and generally pushed the project forward.

The **defibrillator** that will be installed in the phone box has now arrived, thanks to a very generous donation by Stephen Trinder. The next step is to get the power sorted out. BT say the box is still connected but of course we need a qualified electrician to re-organise it so it can supply the defib safely.

The whole point of the device is speed of response. There will be training available but the basic is this: if you are the only person present who can help dial 999 and just keep resuscitation going. If there is another person available and they can get the defib before the paramedics arrive, dial 999, get the defib door release code and RUN!

On return, *just do exactly what the machine tells you to do*. Don't ask questions, there is no time. The machine will analyse the problem automatically and will only respond to the precise conditions it is designed to treat.

Village plans. We have our Village Plan from 2009 of course, which is available on our web site. A lot of research went into that but it was based on an assumption which is no longer valid. That was our belief that the Oxfordshire plan strictly banned any new build outside the Village boundary. The pressures on the Government for new building have resulted in so many loopholes for developers that it is no longer something we can rely on.

There are places round the Village which look as if they could attract developers. All have problems that as locals we are aware of. For example, a significant development on the fields beyond the Allotments would have an impact on the Hardwick Road junction. So we need to heed John Howell's comments and the Parish Council is getting a small group together. We have an excellent starting point: our Clerk Jenny Welham is also Clerk to Woodcote Parish and they have just completed their new Plan.

As I travel around and meet with members of Town and Parish Councils one of the topics that arises again and again is that of Neighbourhood Planning. A Neighbourhood Plan represents the first time communities have had a formal share in the planning system. Once adopted a Neighbourhood Plan carries weight in planning decisions and so it of enormous support to a community in ensuring that its vision for the future is met. Woodcote Parish Council has recent experience of how their Plan has been taken into consideration in reaching a planning decision in line with the community's wishes.

Some have criticised Neighbourhood Plans as being both beyond the technical competence and the budget of smaller communities. Neither of these is true. Plans do not have to be expensive and there is funding available to support plan making. I am delighted that the Minister for Housing and Planning has just announced that the current support funding will continue in the next financial year and also that a new £22.5 million support programme for 3 years from April 2015 has been set up. This will enable more communities to take up Neighbourhood Planning in their area.

I am very keen for infrastructure to be provided on a timely basis. A Neighbourhood Plan represents the first stage in allocating housing not the building of all the houses listed. Neighbourhood Plans can also set out exactly what is required in terms of infrastructure needed and the phasing of both. This will then steer the Infrastructure Delivery Plan which in turn will be used to seek financial contributions. Thus setting out the housing in a Neighbourhood Plan is an important starting point for this. In recent meetings with doctors and managers in GP Practices I have been surprised to learn that they are rarely involved in the Neighbourhood Planning process. I have encouraged them to change this. It is important that the implications on key services such as GP Practices are clearly understood and the need in relation to growth logged at this early stage.

I know too that Broadband provision is a hot topic and am thus delighted that thanks to government investment 20,311 properties across the Henley constituency now have access to superfast broadband and by 2017 a total of 23,098 homes and businesses here will have access. This puts the Henley constituency in the top 6% of constituencies in England receiving superfast broadband investment from the government. This is in addition to those who receive the provision through commercial providers.

Finally, as I write this month I have received news of the new Marriage Allowance that will enable married couples and civil partners to apply for an annual tax reduction of up to £212.

Thames Valley Environmental Records Centre

On the last day of February, I went with Sandra Parkinson to the Thames Valley Environmental Records Centre (TVERC) Conference
The conference, held in Oxford's Natural History Museum, was attended by over 60 people from environmental groups throughout Berks, Bucks and Oxfordshire. Presentations from a variety of speakers and then workshops in the afternoon made for a busy extremely interesting day. Some snippets:

- Judy Webb on Seed Banks i.e. where plants have self-seeded where they grow. This is a complex subject very important to helping rare plants survive and thrive. But here's a basic point: perennials' seeds remain viable for only one or two years, but the viability of annuals' seeds is much longer.
- David Wilding on Birds at Otmoor Nature Reserve and RSPB's successful reestablishment of lapwing populations. Night photography revealed a series of egg-eating predators, including foxes, badgers and lambs A fence has made all the difference. However Red Kites (contrary to their traditional dietary habit) have been seen to take live chicks.
- Dr Jeremy Biggs on the Use of eDNA (environmental DNA) in gathering records: Establishing the presence of the Great Crested Newts' DNA in pond water is proving a very efficient detection method. Whether the newt DNA is retained for longer in sediment is not yet known.
- Dr Paul Waring on the use of species-specific pheromone lures to ascertain the presence of moth populations again, a modern technique proving a useful addition to recorders.

In the afternoon, Sandra - in a workshop led by Dr Darren Mann - was delighted with the chance to see into the huge (over 5 million insects) Hope Entomological Collections. Meanwhile I was busy learning about mammal tracks and other signs they leave behind: 'Poo, prints and more' with Dr Merryl Gelling . This should stand us in good stead for next time WoTHABS has an Explorers' Day for children.

Do please pass on details of wildlife sightings to TVERC online at <u>sightings.tverc.org</u> and whether for single or more sightings, when you do so, do not send in the same record to another online recording site, so there is no duplication of the record/s.

Beating the bounds (well, some of them)

Whitchurch and Whitchurch Hill were once one village in one Parish and in one administrative area. Now the villages are in separate administrative areas, each with their own Parish Council. The original boundary of the villages when combined was shown by the Reverend Slatter in his 1895 sketch (see below and note the inclusion of part of Sulham!). Martin Wise followed and depicted the whole land route for the Whitchurch Hill millenium exhibition.


Apart from the Sulham variation the river formed and forms our southern boundary and on our western flank the boundary rises north east from the river along the edge of Upper Hartslock Wood. It passed Mount Pleasant Farm (with Goring as our neighbour) and then ran east below Mount Pleasant Farm towards Boundary House where it passed between two trees. It then continued eastwards to meet and cross our B471 to the northern side of Hill Bottom Road. Then following east, it went behind The Sun, across the fields, almost directly to Ladygrove Farm. This section enclosed Whitchurch Common, the common land of the villagers before it was forcibly enclosed in the 1800s.

At Ladygrove it is now the byway which crosses our Path Hill Road to continue as Bunces Lane to Collins End and then into the top edge of Long Ground Plantation above Holly Copse Cottage. It follows through the plantation until it meets our eastern and obvious boundary with Mapledurham. Here it turns south to drop to the valley floor and then rises to the rear of Westford Hill Copse and again down by East Lodge to rejoin the river.

An old custom, still practised in parts of the country, is to walk and beat the boundary (with flails of twigs) usually on Rogation Sunday (10 May this year).

The parish priest would bless the boundary at defined points and in some areas the village children were beaten or bumped at these points to ensure that they remembered the boundary location when it became their turn to safeguard it.

Much of our boundary is now on private land and inaccessible and therefore difficult to follow or 'beat' but we can follow some of its route and once it reaches our Hardwick estate it is possible to get reasonably close. Sir Julian has recently kindly given us permission to access these boundary following paths and I hope to plan a walk that will allow us to celebrate our good fortune in living here together and to meet and beat (including the children!).
