Letter from the Vicar

Dear Friends, wonder how you would describe your relationship with your parish church. The English parish

system means that everyone has a parish

church that is in some sense 'theirs', simply because they live within that parish. In a similar way, everyone has an MP who is 'their' MP, simply because they live within that constituency. In each case, however, the sense of belonging or connection will be different from person to person.

Different ways of belongingResearch done between 2007 and 2010 identified four different ways in which people experience and act out a sense of belonging to a church*. Some people's belonging is based on participating regularly in church activities, whether that is Sunday services or activities that take place during the week, such as bible studies or coffee mornings. For other people, their connection is through particular people. That person could be a close friend who is a member of the church congregation. Or it could be someone from the church, clergy or otherwise, who visits them at home in a more formal role. A third way of belonging is through special events, which could be baptisms, weddings or funerals, or seasonal services like Christmas and Easter. The final way of belonging is through place. Here the connection is to the church building, the churchyard, or both. Perhaps the church building is tied up with the community's sense of identity or is felt to be significant as a 'spiritual space' in that location. Perhaps the churchyard is where family members are buried and where their memorials can be visited. Thinking about St. Mary's and/or St. John's, are there any of

special events, with its unique combination of atmosphere, celebration, nostalgia and bringing multiple generations together.

The deepest kind of belonging

Finally, whether you currently feel a sense of belonging or not, at the heart of all our Christmas services is an invitation to belong in a way that is truly life-changing. The God who made and loves the world and everyone in it, the God who has reached out to us in the person of Jesus, this God invites us to belong with him, knowing his love and friendship now and forever. belonging that resonate with you? Of course, they are not mutually exclusive. You could identify with more than one of them or even all four. What is more, when it comes to the local church you don't have to call yourself a churchgoer, or even a Christian, to have some kind of sense of belonging. This is one reason why people of other faiths or no faith might join a group like The Friends of St. Mary's and St. John's to support the upkeep of their local church.

Ways of belonging at this time of year

In the autumn we move into a season when for many people the local church looms larger in their lives than it does in the rest of the year, whether they are regular churchgoers or not. In the past, harvest celebrations were a significant example of that, though this seems to be declining as society changes. By contrast, many churches, including our own, have seen a growing appreciation in recent years for Services of Remembering. These services take place around the time of All Saints' Day (1st November) and All Souls' Day (2nd November)**. They provide a way of remembering loved ones that can be deeply meaningful, especially when they are held in a place that is significant to the lives of those being remembered. Later in November comes Remembrance, strictly a civic event, but one in which the church traditionally has a role to play both nationally and locally.

Next in the church's yearly cycle comes Advent. Aside from Advent calendars, Advent struggles to maintain its distinctiveness in popular culture, as the Christmas season seems to start earlier each year. But I wonder if the church has something to contribute here by emphasising the value of patient waiting in a world that rushes towards indulgence and consumption. And so, finally, to Christmas. Every year the Christingle service on Christmas Eve at St. Mary's is the most well-attended church service in the parish by far. It is perhaps the supreme example of belonging through

Standing in unity with those living in conflict

In early October hundreds gathered in peace, remembrance and unity for a vigil in Oxford. It was led by Bishop Steven and Imam Monawar Hussain, founder of The Oxford Foundation, as co-chairs of the Oxfordshire Civic, Community and Faith Leaders' Group. Standing in unity, to find a third place, neither for nor against, at the point of conflict.

Despite the rain, almost 250 people gathered to hear prayers and readings from Oxfordshire's diverse communities before a two-minute silence was held, lit by candlelit. Welcoming those who attended, Bishop Steven said: "Our purpose is simply to be together, and to be here. Thank you for being here, for doing something in the face of the helplessness that we all feel, in the face of these terrible events. "Louise Gordon, co-vice-president of the Oxford Jewish Congregation, used this prayer: "In sharing our pain we share also our prayer. Praying in our distinctive faith and value systems, languages and voices but with the single message; we pray for peace even as we hold our breath dreading the prospect of more conflict and bloodshed ahead. We reach across the things that could divide us, clasping hands in friendship and clinging to hope."

Welcoming Children and Young People

Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these. (Matthew 19:14). From the earliest days of the church, Christians have understood that children and young people are important to God and so they are to be welcomed, cherished and nurtured. In recent years, however, the church nationally has seen a marked decline in the numbers of children and young people attending regularly. This is now something that is being addressed as a high priority and the national church has identified 'doubling the number of children and young active disciples in the Church of England by 2030' as one of six 'bold outcomes' that it is working towards. Here at Whitchurch the parish church seeks to welcome, support and nurture children and young people in several ways. Both St. John's and St. Mary's have areas where children can play or do activities during services and at several times during the year our services are deliberately designed to include all generations from start to finish, for example at Mothering Sunday, Harvest, Christmas and Easter.

Last year the church took over the running of a local baby and toddler group. Tots on the Thames (formerly Tots on the Hill) now meets on Wednesday mornings during term time at the Old Rectory Stables in Whitchurch on Thames.





In April we launched St. Many's Youth Club. The Youth Club meets on Friday evenings with a session for school years 6 and 7 (roughly ages 10 – 11) and one for years 8 and 9 (ages 12 – 13). We aim to offer a safe 'third space' (alongside school and home)

where young people can enjoy a range of activities from table football to jewellery making, or simply hang out together. Recently we've also run some fun team games for the older age group and these have gone down very well. We're now regularly seeing upwards of 40 young people across the two sessions. Finally, we have been experimenting for the last few months with 'Outdoor Church', gathering once a month at the Whitchurch Maze on a Sunday at 4.00 pm for 30 minutes or so. This is an opportunity to engage with God as multiple generations, learning both from the Bible and from nature, reflecting for example on trees, leaves, sunlight and, most recently, fungi (yes, reallyl). As well as being surrounded by God's beautiful creation, being great for children with energy to burn. Of course, all of this takes time, energy and creativity, which sometimes feels in short supply.

Recently one of the young people at youth club asked a leader 'why do you do this?' The answer is simple, and it is where this article began. It is because we believe that children and young people are important to God, and so they matter to us.

100 YEARS AGO

What was going on in the life of the parish 100 years ago? Here in a new feature is an excerpt from the Whitchurch Parish magazine of December 1924:

WHITCHURCH DISTRICT NURSING ASSOCIATION

It is with great regret that we have to announce the departure of Nurse Williams from our parish owing to her retirement. She has worked here for the past fifteen years and during all those years has given her time and services most unselfishly and generously for the welfare of our people, not only in her professional capacity which was of the highest possible order, but in personality and advice. She has always stood for high ideals and a strong and Christian way of living. She will be greatly

missed by all, and not least by the members of our congregation, with whom she was a constant and devout worshipper. In these days of flippant opinion and such disregard of all social and religious responsi-bilities such a strong character stands out as a real "light" and leaves behind a feeling of loss; but at the same time, while lamenting her absence from our midst, we believe that the *effect* of such lives is a lost, nor can their influence for good be sufficiently realised. Our earnest wishes for her future happiness go with her.

Our new Nurse, whose name is Nurse Morphew, comes on the 26⁶ of this month (Nov.) to take up her duties. We feel sure that all our people will give her a hearty welcome.

INEQE Safeguarding Group independent audit

In June 2024 the Diocese of Oxford underwent an independent audit of its safeguarding work, undertaken by the INEQE Safeguarding Group. It was part of a national programme, commis signed by the Archbishops' Council, to conduct an intensive and comprehensive review of safeguarding at each diocese and cathedral in the Church of England.

The report's authors found the Diocese of Oxford to have 'a solid safeguarding foundation delivered by its exceptionally well-led and blended Safeguarding Team'. The report commended what it described as a 'safeguarding first' philosophy and congratulated our parishes for the sense of optimism it found on the frontline 'where talented Parish Safeguarding Officers (PSOs) lead by example' and 'collaboration is strong'.
