CHAIRMAN'S UPDATE, APRIL 2022

I am so pleased to see community events such as the Saturday morning Art Café and monthly Thursday afternoon teas at the Village Hall becoming popular again. I realise that some are still cautious about re-engaging in community activities following the pandemic, but I would like to invite everyone to a few traditional community events that we will be having this Spring in person for the first time in quite a while. Please consider joining these events if you can. Everyone is welcome!

Annual Parish Assembly – will be held on Thursday 26th May in the village hall with wine and nibbles being offered at 7:30 for a 7:45 pm start. This is the meeting where the Parish Council and a number of local community groups give short updates on what they are doing. It's a great way to find out what's happening in the village. Everything from bell ringing to cricket and football clubs, to the theatre and history groups. It's also where we present the annual Whitchurch Award to a deserving volunteer.

Beacon Lighting for the Queen's Jubilee – The Green Team is organising beacon lighting on the evening of Thursday 2nd June on a hill overlooking the village. This will be part of over 2,000 beacons being lit across the country in honour of the Queen that evening. All beacons are due to be lit at 9:45pm and ours should be visible from the south end of the Village Green. Those interested in seeing it should gather near the Pavilion from 9:30pm. If you are interested in helping prepare the site or build the bonfire, please contact Charles Cotgreave at charles cotgreave@yahoo.co.uk.

Queen's Jubilee Tea – We are looking forward to hosting a Queen's Platinum Jubilee event on the Village Green on Sunday 5th June 2-5pm. The Roy Bailey Big Band will be playing from 2-4pm. It is a free event and generally meant to allow villagers to socialise and catch up with neighbours so I hope to see you there! Tea will be available free of charge and Pimms and other drinks will be available for purchase. We are looking for contributions of cakes/scones/biscuits/ little tea sandwiches from residents to share at a communal table

but it is not necessary to bring anything as there is normally more than enough to go around. The Primary School is also organising a bunting initiative to decorate the village. More details later in the Bulletin. Please contact our Clerk Jane Yamamoto (parishclerk.whitchurchonthames@gmail.com) or Nicola Armstrong (nicola.luetchford@btinternet.com) from the Pre-school with any questions.

Other matters that the Parish Council has been addressing include:

20mph is coming to the village 13th May! – Following the recent consultation, Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) has formally approved 20mph for the village. Contractors are due to start the practical works to change the speed limit from 30mph to 20mph on Wednesday 11th May and are allowing until Friday 13th for this to be completed. The necessary legal changes will then take effect from the 13th.

The signage change will use existing poles apart from two new locations in Eastfield Lane (opposite the sewage pumping station and on the opposite side of the road and between properties Ash Tree Paddock and Hannington) where small 20mph 'repeater' poles will be required. OCC have specified for these to be black painted poles (as opposed to the brighter zinc plated) to be more 'in keeping' with the historic nature of the village.

As this is something that the village has been seeking since at least the 2009 Village Plan, we would like to have a photo taken officially opening the 20mph speed limit on the 13th of May, probably by the Toll Bridge and village sign. We will post the exact timing on the web-site so any resident interested in joining can participate. It looks like Friday the 13th of May is will be an auspicious date for the village this year!

Lower Narrows Bollards – Despite the Manchester-style bollards being ordered and delivered to OCC, the plans to install them at the pavement by the Ferryboat Inn is now under review. Following a site meeting on the 15th March, some concerns have arisen over the

proximity of the various underground utilities. The main challenges are four underground electricity cables which are all running within the vicinity of the virtual pavement. OCC has been talking to the electricity supplier about this and will meet with them on 27th April. It seems likely that there will be changes to the originally proposed scheme.

Muddy Lane – We are working with Charles Cotgreave and Neil Huntington of the Green Team to plan surface improvements to make Muddy Lane a little less muddy. Despite it being relatively dry at the moment, the muddy surface during winter months is something that particularly affects parents on the school run. We have received quotes from local contractors to smooth the surface and add road scalpings. There would be a 1.5m strip of scalpings from the allotments to the school as a walkway and a wider area of surfacing from the allotments to Hardwick Road. The improvements would not significantly change the appearance of the lane and there will still be a need to clear it of leaves once a year to avoid future build-up of mud. The Parish Council has received a grant from County Cllr Bulmer to cover much of the improvements. A decision on this is planned for the May Parish Council meeting.

Re-establishment of Manor Road Yew Trees – The Parish Council is reviewing plans to re-establish the historic row of Yew Trees on the south side of Manor Road that formed the entrance to Combe Park. The area that would be affected is on the south side of Manor Road leading up to the playground. The change would involve removal of approximately 18 mostly Sycamore trees and Laurel undergrowth, and replacing them with a row of young yew trees to match the opposite side of the road. Cllr Higley has written a short article on this for the Village website. Please contact her with any comments or questions.

Thames Path – Hartley Steps Signs – The signs cautioning cyclists of the steep dip on the Thames Path at the end of Hartslock bridleway have now been installed. The signs also formally label the steps as being named after resident Eric Hartley who recently celebrated his 90th birthday. Eric, a long-time advocate of walking in the area,

worked with OCC to get the steps improved and re-instated in 2011 and 2012 after the previous deteriorated steps were removed.

Coombe Park – Cllrs Smith, Higley and I were invited to visit Coombe Park with their planning consultant to see the property ahead of the planning application being formally submitted to demolish and rebuild the main house. Plans for this change are now available on the SODC Planning portal. The Parish Council will be reviewing the plans at our May meeting. The Coombe Park owner may be willing to arrange another site visit for residents if there is interest based on the reaction to the plans.

Community Jubilee Bunting

To celebrate The Queen's Platinum Jubilee, you and your family are invited to participate in a community jubilee bunting project to display along the toll bridge in partnership with the children and families from Whitchurch Primary School. The intention of the project is to decorate a silhouette of the Queen in any way you like (collage, pastels, paint etc) which will then be collated to create a set of community bunting.

A template for the project (silhouette of the Queen) can either be downloaded from the Whitchurch web or can be collected at one of the events detailed below where they will also be an opportunity to decorate your piece together.

If you would like to participate, please come and see myself, Nicola, at the Art Cafe on the 7th May 10.30-12.30.

Or, Gill at a Knit and Stitch at the Old Stables on either the 12th May or 26th May, 2-4pm or 7-9pm.

Any completed artwork please leave in my porch - Mill Cottage, High Street (down the end of Mill Drive next to the toll bridge, blue door). There will be a tray in the porch.

Final plea- If you have any white sheeting that we could use as bunting please deliver to Gill at Rosemead, Eastfield Lane.

We look forward to seeing what you create and hope you get inspired to decorate your own house for Jubilee- turning the village, red, white and blue!

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR REPORT

South Oxfordshire District Council collects council tax from us all, but it actually keeps only a small proportion of it, as it also acts on behalf of the Police, County Council and parish councils in collecting council tax. For a band D property, the standard bench mark, out of a total tax bill of £2,089, the South Oxfordshire District Council part will be £136. This compares with £241 for the Police and £1,651 for the County Council, and £60 for the Parish Council.

All these bodies have increased their element of the council tax, although the District Council's increase is the smallest at £5 for a band D Dwelling. SODC council tax remains the 8th lowest in the country for a similar rural district. Through more careful stewardship and planning, the savings made in the last year and projected forward have improved the financial position. As a result, £500,000 is available to improve our environment through hedge and tree planting, promoting green skills and businesses and cleaning up our built environment.

One of the obligations on SODC is to provide Bed and Breakfast accommodation; we discovered that the council had received capital funding some years ago, ring fenced for this issue, which had not been used, and this is now going to be used to acquire some property that can be used to address this obligation, potentially saving £65,000 a year.

We continue to see the benefits of the cancellation of the contract that outsourced many of the core activities of the Council. I am on the audit and scrutiny committee, and it was apparent that having Capita employees rather than our own staff "doing the books" resulted in additional costs. This was particularly evident when it came to preparing the annual accounts, as poor book-keeping held up the audit by Ernst & Young, which resulted in additional costs to the Council.

With the accounts now done in-house, the senior finance team are better able to analyse and plan, and so draw a clearer picture of the Council's finances.

One of the key documents that the Finance Department has to prepare is the Medium-term Financial Plan, looking ahead five years. This has often presented a rather alarming picture, showing a deteriorating financial position. The first such plan I saw, in May 2019, predicted that the General Fund Balance, ie the Council's reserves, would have fallen from £26 million to £5 million by 2022/23. As it has turned out, the latest plan shows that the expected £5 million actually came in much better at £25 million for 2022/23, and looking ahead the next five years, the balance is £18 million. By scrapping the outsourcing contract with Capita, not only does the Council now have a better control over the accounting and bookkeeping processes, it has also made significant savings.

It undoubtedly helps that at least three of the members of the Cabinet of the Council are qualified accountants and are therefore able to provide a professional approach to the Council's finances. As far as I can ascertain, there were no qualified accountants in the SODC Cabinet in the previous administration.

Parking charges are increasing at the council owned and run carparks. The objective is that the carparks break-even, however over the last two years income dropped to just over £700,000 a year, while costs were just under £1 million. The intention is that the car parks should self-finance and not require subsidy from Council tax.

There is normally one free hour for all motorists, and car parking in South Oxfordshire is relatively cheap compared to Reading or Oxford.

The Council is also installing electric vehicle charging points at carparks in Henley and Wallingford and these will be available for overnight booking for residents.

THE GREEN TEAM

Since the last Bulletin, fourteen working parties have been held and people throughout the village have, often unasked, helped with various tasks. The storms in February led to additional work. Some key points are indicated below.

• List of Green Spaces. We are lucky to have many green spaces in the village; our primary goal is to care for these. The list can be found on our website page: https://whitchurchonthames.com/groups/greenteam.html. Photos of the team at work appear in the Pictures section of the website.

- **Storm damage.** A number of trees were blown down or damaged in February. We cut up or cut back a number of trees, at the far end of Eastfield Lane, in the Maze and along Muddy Lane.
- Village Green and the Maze. We have regular working parties maintaining these areas. At the Maze we work together with WoTHABS to edge and maintain the central area. We resumed work on the Maze in April after the winter break. Work on the Village Green has been mostly at the southern-end, where we have cleared invasive plants and unwanted saplings and have explored constructive ways of disposing of the resulting waste material. We have planted geraniums alongside the ferns and cotoneaster shrubs at the entrance to the car park and foxgloves have recently been added.
- Polish Church Garden Project. Details and latest updates can be found here: https://whitchurchonthames.com/groups/polishgarden.html. Together with WOTHABS the Green Team levelled the ground at the southeast corner and dug holes in preparation for planting heritage fruit trees for the community orchard. Bird boxes have been mounted on trees in the copse. We also cut down some unwanted straggling trees along the southern edge, and cut back brambles.
- Jubilee Beacon Site. We are preparing a prominent site visible from the Village Green for a beacon bonfire to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee on 2nd June. Volunteers are welcome to join us towards the end of May and beginning of June, to construct the beacon and to light and manage it.

We welcome all who would like to help with Green Team work. Our working parties last from an hour up to two or three but you don't have to stay for the duration. In (say) half an hour or an hour you can still make a worthwhile contribution. THE FRIENDS OF ST MARY'S & ST JOHN'S, WHITCHURCH (AN INDEPENDENT CHARITY)

The Friends of St Mary's & St John's, Whitchurch held their 5th AGM on Saturday 29th January in The Old Stables. Paul Witcher was unanimously re-elected as a trustee and he will continue in his role as Chairman of the trustees. The AGM was well-attended and there was some interesting discussion on future projects that are being considered by the PCC, for which The Friends may be asked to contribute towards the costs.

We have held two successful ArtCafe sessions so far this year (in February and April) – these are an excellent way of raising funds for future projects and also to publicise the aims of our charity.

During the winter months, we organised six working parties in the churchyards, both at St Mary's and St John's. We have had good turnouts of members and volunteers which has resulted in some very visible changes. At St Mary's, the focus has been on the area to the south of the church, where the impressive memorials to the Victorian 'great and good' of the village are buried. At St John's, we are endeavouring to control the trees and shrubs that have self-seeded in the graves and covered the historic mortuary building.

The most immediate project that is now in hand by the PCC is the replacement path at St John's, which will run between the lychgate and the porch. In its current state, it is very difficult to negotiate with wheelchairs and walking frames. The Friends will be contributing 75% of the total cost of this much-needed improvement. When completed, we plan to hold an informal 'Open Day' at St John's. The communities of both Whitchurch and Whitchurch Hill will be invited to come and see how some of The Friends' funds have been spent, to the benefit of visitors to the church and its churchyard. The church itself will also be open to give visitors a chance to see inside this charming unspoiled Victorian gem. Look out for the publicity which will be on the website and on posters, when the date has been fixed.

Thank you to all those who have supported our ArtCafes and the working parties – our small local charity would not be able to achieve its aims without your help.

We are located next to, and with close links to, Whitchurch Primary School, on Eastfield Lane. An exhibition of stunning Artworks from Crafty Knit & Stitch By Jayne Davidson



In 2019 I became involved in a project initiated by local artist Gill Williamson to raise awareness of homelessness after a talk given at Crafty Knit & Stitch by Launchpad, a Reading based charity who work with individuals and families who have no reliable housing or a shelter of any form.

Crafty Knit & Stitch met regularly to create #Faceup to Homelessness, a collection of quilts with appliqued faces using recycled fabric. The concept was based on quilts being the most basic form of shelter; a covering under which to sleep. Gill also involved other local groups who made collage faces from left-over wrapping paper.
