

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## CHAIRMAN'S UPDATE – APRIL 2025

Hello everyone! It would be remiss of me to not mention the beautiful Spring weather we have been having. The cherry blossoms and wildflowers are blooming, the Village Green has just been cut for the first time, Muddy Lane is dry and even the condition of Eastfield Lane somehow seems more bearable in this weather.

**Emergency Planning Activities** – Before we get too comfortable, I would like to remind everyone of some of the actitivies the village's Emergency Team has been involved in.

- A successful demonstration of an emergency power outage scenario was held at the Village Hall – more on this later in the Bulletin. Thank you to John Bradon for organising this successful demonstration with support from Charles Cotgreave and Adrian Dixon. And thanks to Neil Huntington for volunteering to be a contact for future power outage scenarios at the Village Hall. Our newest Parish Councillor Romilly Swann also participated and provided many helpful inputs.
- We are still working with OCC and SODC to get the water culvert/pipe/ watercourse cleared near Eastfield Lane. When the River Thames is very high, such as in January 2024, the culvert is unable to cope with the water entering it from above Pangbourne weir. OCC have now asked us to apply for a grant to help them fund the work and we are optimistic this will be approved, and the work will be completed soon.
- The Parish Council also approved an up to date Emergency Plan at our April meeting as we do each year to ensure we are prepared for several emergency scenarios.

**Manor Road Sinkhole** – Following the repair to the sinkhole in February, I have followed up with both Thames Water and OCC to confirm if the playground area is now safe from sewage leaks. I received the following assurances:

- The manhole was marked with PO for 'Pump Out' meaning that it may have been used during the repair to help pump out sewage from the line.
- They confirmed there is no leakage around the manhole and it is in good condition, although now that we know that a high-pressure sewage line runs beneath it, we should be vigilant of any future leaks.
- If there was any spillage during the repair they would have used disinfectant, but any remaining bacteria are also killed by UV light within 11 -18 days.
- The Parish Council is still concerned about tripping hazards on the manhole on the playground and will work with volunteers to build the soil up around this to make it safer.
- I have asked OCC Highways to inspect the Thames Water repair work, including the kerb on the east side of the road that is sunken, and to find out why there are also still some barricades left over from Thames Water.
   OCC Highways have assured me that they are looking into these issues and will have them rectified.

**Biffa Deep Cleaning of Pavements –** The Parish Council requested this annual deep cleaning to address all pavements in the village, including Hardwick Road and the High Street. The Biffa team have confirmed that our village's deep cleaning is scheduled for 12-14 May. I have also requested cleaning of the High Street again which appears to have been done in early April, including in the stretch by the toll bridge which was previously missed.

**Cedar Lodge** – You may have heard that there was a problem with the main Cedar Lodge contractor, J Guest. I have spoken to the Zephyr X Programme Director who confirmed that their contractor had gone into liquidation after 35 years of business due to a cash flow shortage stemming from other projects they were engaged in unrelated to Cedar Lodge. Zephyr X quickly replaced their main contractor with another contractor that they use for other care home projects. All subcontractors subsequently reported to this new contractor and work continues.

They tell me that this has delayed the expected completion of the main building work from the end of March until mid-April. There is a CQC inspection of the completed care home planned for early May and an opening event is still planned for 9th May. Residents will likely move in later in May

**Eastfield lane** – There is less mud and debris due to a number of factors, including regular street cleaning from Zephyr X and the dry weather.

- I requested that OCC Highways make further interim repairs on Eastfield Lane in March. This resulted in about nine sections of the road being improved on 11<sup>th</sup> April. These appear to be good quality patches addressing the worst sections of the road.
- The road is due for an inspection in May by which time the Cedar Lodge care home work should be complete. Further actions will be raised if necessary.
- OCC Highways position seems to have changed in that they are not holding the Cedar Lodge contractor as being responsible for 'making good' the damage to the road as it has also been used for other construction projects and OCC cannot determine which contractor caused the damage.
- Zephyr X will repair verges but say that are not allowed to repair the road, other than temporary fill with gravel and soil which they have been doing.
- The Parish Council would clearly like to see the damaged sections of the road resurfaced and are investigating the best options to achieve this.

Village drains clearing – Following work that was completed by OCC last November and January, the village drains seem to be in generally the best condition I have seen in years. You may also have seen that the drainage catch-pits along the steep Whitchurch hill were cleared in February. This will help to keep High Street drains clear in periods of heavy rain. A couple of drains in the village were missed in the recent clearing and I am still following this up with OCC. They have committed to prioritising this work when they can, however there are a number of changes happening now at OCC Highways including a new drainage supplier and a new programme of work for this financial year that will prioritise the larger towns initially.



Many of you will know that Romilly is a long-time resident of Hardwick Estate with a wealth of knowledge on subjects ranging from botany, archaeology, traditional dyeing techniques and sheep farming. She has also recently been elected as one of the first trustees of the new Hardwick Charitable Trust and will be able to provide a valuable link between Hardwick and the rest of the village.

The Parish Council voted to object and submit the following comments

"Whitchurch-on-Thames Parish Council consider the contents of this application and the proposed changes to be inappropriate for a Section 73 application. The Parish Council strongly feels that the proposed changes are not of a minor nature, and that a new, part-retrospective planning application would be more appropriate in this case. The Parish Council continues to stronaly object to this application. and fully supports the residents of Eastfield Lane who have lodged objections on the planning portal. The Parish Council considers this development to be unneighbourly, overbearing, and oppressive in its scale and bulk, out of proportion and damaging to the street scene of existing dwellings along Eastfield Lane and the Whitchurch-On-Thames Conservation Area. The Parish Council has concerns over the siting of the Plant Room, now proposed to be at ground level and likely to be a source of noise disturbance to neighbours. The Parish Council is concerned that there is no mention of any plans for the safe evacuation of fumes from this area, or from the kitchen area, fearing a buildup of smells and cooking aromas which would create an unpleasant environment for neighbours. Finally, the Parish Council requests that, should the Planning Officer be minded to approve this application, that it be called to panel for a final decision to be taken" Granted on 4/4/25The Parish Council voted to support this application

## DISTRICT COUNCILLOR COMMENTS

It is likely that South Oxfordshire District Council is going to follow Goring Rural District Council (1894–1932) and Henley Rural District Council (1894–1972) into oblivion, and we will be governed by a new unitary authority which, if the current proposals from the government come to fruition will have a minimum population of 500,000. This compares to the current population of South Oxfordshire of around 153,000.

A unitary authority covers all the activity handled both by the District as well as the functions of the County Council. The Districts Council's functions are quite well defined, principally planning and waste collection, and it can also encompass social housing, although in South Oxfordshire we hived off responsibility for that to a housing association many years ago. The County Council includes Highways and Waste disposal, plus libraries and education, and the huge responsibility of adult and children's social services. Social services take up over 50% of the Oxfordshire County Council Budget.

Over the years, the County Councils have lost various responsibilities. Most recently, schools have been able to opt out into Academies, before that, Further Education Colleges, some community health services and the Ambulance service were moved on from County Council control.

Exactly how we will fall into a unitary authority is not at all clear at the moment. Bundling South Oxfordshire, the Vale of White Horse, Cherwell, West Oxfordshire District Council and Oxford City Council together in one huge mega county council is one option, which would have a population of about 730,000. This would tick the government's size box, and could be one component of the suggested strategic authority that is also proposed, a mayoral organisation on the model of Manchester or Birmingham. In such an authority we would perhaps be bundled in with Buckinghamshire, Milton Keynes and Berkshire. Whether larger organisations will achieve the desired objective of economic growth is difficult to judge, although all the experts seem to think it's a good thing. The same was said of the local government reorganisation of the 1970's, and was also the same message that come out repeatedly as the National Health Service was re-organised again and again from the late 1960's onwards, with for example Regional Authorities created, then abolished and then re-instated.

Of course, with ever larger organisations, the voice of residents gets progressively fainter, with elected representatives, if any, inevitably working to their own agendas or political agendas or government directives and decision making increasingly influenced by powerful lobby groups.

If we do end up with these mega authorities, I think it would be good if there was some sort of mechanism for the term of office for elected people to be ended by popular demand, as is now the case with MPs, who can be the subject of a recall petition.

## Results of Speed Monitoring in the High Street – November 2024

**Aims:** To get some up-to-date, 24 hours-a-day data on traffic speeds and flows in both directions on the High Street and to compare these with data from 2018 and 2021. It is hoped that analysis of this data can help inform future Speedwatch sessions and additional measures which may be needed to boost speed awareness.

Acknowledged Shortcomings: The wires were only down for nine days. The data provided by OCC contains a lot of averages, which are rather useless on our High Street given stationary or very slow-moving traffic twice a day. However, individual speeds are also provided, so I have focused on analysing those as they are much more meaningful.

### Q: Have the 20mph limit and Speedwatch sessions had any effect?

A: Yes! In our sample week in November 2024 **61%** of northbound drivers (9020 of them) were doing between 15 & 25mph as were **65%** of southbound drivers (9694).

Compare that with 2018 when just **49%** of northbound drivers and **56%** of southbound drivers were doing between 15 & 25mph.

Likewise, **23%** of northbound drivers and **20%** of southbound drivers were in the next speed bracket (25-35mph) in 2024 against **39%** and **41%** in 2021 and **35%** and **31%** in 2018.

In addition, we have had confirmation from Thames Valley Police that over 1,000 letters have been sent out to people caught doing 30mph and over since the Speedwatch group started in April 2023.

## Q: Has the percentage of drivers doing a higher speed (40-50mph) changed between 2018 and 2024?

A: No. In percentage terms they remain the same: 0.2% northbound and 0.1% southbound. However, because the overall traffic level was higher in 2024 than 2018 the numbers of vehicles doing 40–50mph in 2024 were greater: 41 northbound and 15 southbound.

## Q: What was the highest recorded speed in the sample week in Nov 2024?

A: 65-70mph! 2 cars, driving northbound between 10am & 11am. (There is always the possibility that these might have been emergency services).

### Q: What time of day is the worst for speeding?

A: In terms of frequency, it was 8am – 9am (5 cars, doing between 55 & 60mph). But there were speeders recorded throughout the day (lunchtime and between 3pm and 4pm and the occasional early morning).

#### Q: Which direction is worst for speeding?

A: Northbound. Interestingly, in our sample November week there were **no** speeds recorded above 50mph going southbound.

### Volume of Traffic:

### Q: Is there less traffic in the High Street in 2024 compared with 2018 and 2021?

A: Yes and no, and not what one might assume: There appears to be a higher number of vehicles in 2024 than in 2018.

The two-way, seven-day total in 2024 was **29,357** vs 27,880 in 2018. However, when you compare 2024 with 2021, it is 2021 which sees the much higher volume of traffic with **36,165** over a seven-day period (two way). Likewise, there appears to be no fixed pattern for the volume of traffic in November 2024 with daily totals ranging from 2533 to 5372.

#### Conclusions:

1. The 20mph speed limit has been a good thing and Speedwatch sessions have been worthwhile as speeds are demonstrably lower in 2024 than they were in either 2021 or 2018.

2. Speedwatchers cannot be out early or late for several months of the year due to lack of light. They will therefore never be able to report excessive speeds which take place at these times of day. However, there are still persistent offenders who will speed during the day. 3. Given the sheer volume of traffic going up and down the High Street with some alarmingly high speeds as well as cyclists, mobility scooter users and pedestrians, there is a strong case to be made for additional measures which are now common in surrounding villages such as speed indicator devices. The Parish Council and members of the Speedwatch group are discussing these possibilities with OCC.

Hardwick Road: We won't forget about Hardwick Road as we know that speeding is a problem there too. Because of the much higher volume of traffic in the High Street it probably makes sense to sort this out first, but there is nothing to stop us having a speed survey done in Hardwick Road later this year.

## **NEWCOMERS AND OUR "COCOON"**

A number of houses in the village, have recently changed hands. I am sure that the newcomers will be welcomed but they may not know what a wise choice they have made.

In Whitchurch on Thames, we not only live in a circumscribed "Conservation Area" but also the majority of us live in another bubble; a "Cocoon" where our daily life for most of us is unhindered by constant traffic noise or the presence of obvious commerce (we leave all that behind when we cross our Toll Bridge). Perhaps that and other benefits are what we unknowingly also pay for?

The next benefit is that we can immediately access the natural beauty which greets us if we look or step outside. The Beech woods are there for you to explore, but we also have access to history; we are surrounded by reminders of those who have gone before us. From *Achulean* hand axes and Stone Age Scarpers in our gardens to our daily use of the *Tuddingway*, an ancient highway and trade route. At some time, most of us walk along Hardwick Road (now part of the King Alfred cycle route from Goring to Mapledurham and onwards to Reading) and many of us use the Hartslock Bridleway to walk or cycle to Goring or to access our section of the long-distance modern Thames Path. When you walk on either of these two routes (east or west) you are following in the footsteps of our previous Saxon villagers and many before us on the *Tuddingway*.

The Iron Age fort encampment sits above us as another immediate reminder of the past, also the lower level Sheepwash Lane, its name similarly evokes thoughts as it gives us our only main access to the river. Access to all our major points of history is immediately available to you, all our major paths are suitably marked and described and await your boots! The village web site gives you access to my "12 village walks" which will gradually introduce you to our world, completely different to any other hereabouts. You can extend this to 24 walks by walking the same walks in the opposite direction and you will be surprised by what you missed, particularly the views of the valley when going downhill. So you can spend a year of weekend walking and exploring without going outside our village boundaries. What need for elsewhere other than your new home and village? When you have completed these local walks and you feel more adventurous, and willing to explore further, there are 27 other walks on the web site, written and available to you to scan and copy.

Another benefit I have marked is the friendliness and neighbourliness of all our villagers, particularly the many dog walkers. Maybe it is true of all villages, and indeed this is the only one I have lived in for any length of time, but perhaps the close neighbourhood of most of the village - our "Cocoon" - encourages and enables this.

Enjoy the experience of living here.

## ST MARY'S CHURCH SAVE OUR SPIRE APPEAL IS LAUNCHED!

Around 40 people attended the launch event at St Mary's on Friday 11<sup>th</sup> April, where the *Save Our Spire* team shared interesting information on the background to the project, the history of the Church and its role in our lives and our community, along with detailed information on what restoration is needed and why.

There is a big fundraising challenge with a further £200,000 to be raised. Grant applications are being progressed alongside local fundraising and community engagement. ## WILD OXFORDSHIRE

#### Hedgerows in Spring

Spring is the season of growth, and our local hedgerows are no exception. This season you can expect to see hedge species beginning to flower. Blackthorn will begin to flower from early spring, blossoming before its leaves even begin to show, into beautiful five petal white flowers strikingly similar to Hawthorn. Hawthorn, however, like Buckthorn, Guelder Rose, Dogwood, Wayfaring and Spindle blossoms later in mid spring. Cherry Plum (which began to blossom in winter) will only continue flowering into early spring, preparing to bear berries in early summer.

All of these species are extremely beneficial to pollinators as well as other insects that feed on hedges (eg Chestnut moths and Brown hairstreak butterflies). Observe the wildlife benefits mature hedges offer this Spring and get ready to see them in your own local spaces once your newly planted hedgerows reach maturity!

#### A Selection of Garden jobs to Help Wildlife this Spring

Everyone's waking up!

- Put out bird food with high fat content to give extra energy when food is hard to come by. Suet treats like fat balls are ideal and sunflower hearts.
- Feed hedgehogs and create at least one hedgehog gap
- Have plants in your garden that offer winter/early spring nectar e.g. mahonia, ivy, willow, hellebores, crocuses and snowdrops to provide a boost for our pollinators after the dormant months. You can also start to think about sowing seeds. Have a look at the packets as many are now marked with a 'pollinator-friendly' symbol. Why not grow your own bird food this year and grow sunflowers?
- Create a pond or improve yours for amphibians
- Leave perennials and herbaceous, hollow-stemmed plants unpruned until early April or late this month. These will still be providing homes for overwintering invertebrates like ladybirds.
- On freezing days, break the ice on bird baths and water bowls. Refresh the water supply weekly.

- Build a bug hotel
- Leave piles of leaves and logs undisturbed. In mild weather, it can be tempting to get going in the garden but avoid the urge to tidy away leaf and log piles just yet. Wait until late this month or early April.
- Avoid turning the compost heap until April, even if conditions are mild. Frogs, small mammals, and insects may be hibernating, and any disturbance could harm them.
- Check bonfires before they are lit for sheltering and hibernating animals, such as hedgehogs, toads, frogs, and newts.

## HARDWICK HAPPENINGS

#### Stud Farm Update

The future of the Stud Farm and the surrounding land, which we know holds deep significance for many of you has, finally been settled. As you may be aware, the Estate provided notice on the Stud Farm tenancy three years ago. Since then, we have worked closely with the tenants to ensure that this transition is managed in a way that is fair and balanced for all parties involved.

This has been a very difficult and emotional process, and we acknowledge the challenges it has presented. While legal proceedings were initially pursued by the tenants and defended by the Estate, it soon became clear that a prolonged dispute would come at a significant financial and emotional cost to both parties. We are therefore pleased to share that an amicable resolution has been reached, avoiding the need for further legal action and the stress that comes with it. By settling this matter outside of court, we have ensured a fair and practical solution that spares everyone from unnecessary strain. As part of this agreement, the tenants will vacate the Stud Farm and surrounding land by 1st October 2025. Additionally, in recognition of the need for a smooth transition, they will retain access to some areas for a further 6 months, allowing time to relocate equipment in a practical and manageable way.

We want to take this opportunity to sincerely thank the tenants for their cooperation and understanding throughout this complex and emotional process. Their willingness to engage in constructive dialogue has been instrumental in reaching a resolution that works for everyone, and we deeply appreciate the patience and collaboration that have allowed us to move forward in a way that prioritises both financial and emotional well-being.

#### Transition News - Interim Trustees Elected

Congratulations to Hardwick's first community Trustees whose election was announced at our 'Interim AGM' event on Thursday 3rd April. The night was a huge success due to the ongoing commitment of the Hardwick community and the relentless hard work given by the transition Steering Group who have guided this process over the last year. Participation in the election was very high with 51 participating in the nomination process; 58 people were nominated; of those 18 people chose to stand for the election. 62 people voted out of a potential 80 people who are eligible to vote. That is a very impressive 77.5% turnout! The seven new interim trustees will now be able to co-opt up to five further Trustees from within or outside the community who bring skills and experience they need. We expect the full board to be complete by July. Watch this space for more transition news throughout the year.
