CAPTURING THE PAST BY DESIGN AND ACCIDENT

Anyone visiting the Historic Photos section of the village website will see that it has recently grown significantly. Both the number of photographs and variety of subjects has been increased to cover a wider spectrum of village history. This is thanks to the fact that I have recently been delving through my extensive archive of photographs that stretch back over fifty years. Why have I decided to do this now?

Recently, I realised with a shock that not only have I been a serious photographer for over half a century, but I have never mounted an exhibition of my work. So, I decided on a project which I have called "Photos Are My Life - Half a Century Through the Lens of Nick Brazil". I am now well on the way to selecting the 150 – 200 pictures that will comprise this exhibition.

Naturally, I wanted to show photographs that represented every stage of my life as a photographer. It was this that led me to rediscover the photographs now residing in the Historic Photos section. I am sure that many village residents will find these pictures interesting especially if I explain the stories behind some of them.

The first two photographs show the "old" War Memorial being cleaned. This was an annual event which I was keen to capture on film in about 1980 because I had planned to produce a book on Whitchurch called "The Village Year". Although the book never reached fruition, I am now very glad that I took the photographs. The War Memorial with its Celtic style cross was destroyed in the great storm of 1987. I suspect that catastrophic event marked the end of the annual cleaning. As in the case of many of the pictures, I failed to record the name of the gentleman who cleaned the cross on that occasion. So if anyone knows his name please contact me or the website.

I am very glad that I had the presence of mind to photograph the knife grinder. He was a regular visitor to the village in the mid to late 1970s. On this occasion, I photographed him for my proposed book. This was a very good thing because that was the last time I ever saw him in the village.

No doubt many people will find the photographs of the 1977 Jubilee Celebrations of great interest, not least because they were one of those colourfully dressed children. Yes, its difficult to believe that was thirty eight years ago isn't it? That would put those children in their mid forties today.

The bee keeper was Jim Read who lived with his family in Eastfield Lane. I shot a whole sequence of photographs of him attending to his hives down at Hardwick. On that occasion, I shot on black and white film which often stands

the test of time better than colour. Once again some of those photos were planned for my book but now at least one will grace my upcoming exhibition.

The allotment photographs were also intended for my book. To my shame I omitted to record the name of the green fingered gentleman who is the subject, so if anyone can help with that information, I would be most grateful. I remember at the time thinking it was important to record allotment life since I was sure it would soon disappear. I am delighted that I was completely wrong on that count! Of additional interest is the background in these photographs and how it has changed over the years.

Finally, there is the photograph of the farm house at Bozedown which I think I took in the Autumn of 1980 or it could be earlier. This is pretty topical since that particular building has only recently been demolished. This is actually two photographs stitched together in Photoshop to make a panorama. Doing a series of village panoramas was another little project of mine which circumstances would cause to be temporarily stillborn.

As I discover more pictures from Whitchurch in the past I will add them to the archive on the website, so please look at it regularly.

And remember, whenever we use our cameras we are all accidental historians.

May I also say thank you to all those who work hard in our communities to make them special for the rest of us. So many different things go on across the constituency that help to keep our communities vibrant and good places in which to live. It is always a pleasure when I get the opportunity to visit community activities and I look forward to learning yet more about what is being done in 2016.

News Update

In a brief newsletter I cannot cover all that are on my mind at present. I will therefore leave those that have been widely covered in the media and focus on some of the other issues that have been more frequently raised with me.

With the 2015 Paris climate change conference on the horizon some key issues have been raised on this. I am pleased that the UK is taking a leading role on this. The Secretary of State has said that she wants a strong, ambitious, rules-based agreement that makes the shift to a clean global economy irreversible. I don't believe that climate change is a side issue that we can take or leave. The environment is important in itself but it also has implications for the economy and our economic security.

Access to personal communications data has been another key issue. Whilst many people understand the need for our intelligence agencies to be able to intercept potential terrorist activity, the Investigatory Powers Bill has raised some concerns. Following independent reviews I am pleased that the Home Secretary has announced that there will be a 'double-lock' authorisation process for interception warrants, requiring approval by a judge as well as by the Secretary of State.

A totally different concern that has been raised over time is that of funding to our schools as historically Oxfordshire schools are among those disadvantaged by the current funding formula. I recently arranged a meeting at the House for representatives from the schools and all of the Oxfordshire MPs. Although there are no quick solutions to their concerns. I am pleased that they have been able to raise them face to face with the MPs including the Prime Minister.

THE WHITCHURCH SOCIETY: NEW YEAR'S DAY WALK 2016

Eric started the Village Walks on New Year's Day 2008, and during the following eight years he planned 27 interesting, varied and beautiful walks. His knowledge of all the paths (and of their historical associations) was unrivalled, and we must have walked parts of all the paths going east, west and north from Whitchurch. This means it will be difficult to find completely new routes in future, assuming we stay north of the Thames.

So, on New Year's Day 2016 we (i.e. Roger Crawford, Richard Williams and I) thought we would repeat the very first walk from NYD 2008, parts of which we haven't walked for some time. We shall meet outside the Greyhound at 11.00 am and proceed up the hill past the war memorial and Stonecroft Plantation to Beech Farm. After this we shall make our way across the main road to St John's Church, and then to the Iron Age fort. We shall go up Town Lane and across to Path Hill Farm and then enter the woods above Hardwick House. We can take a shorter route when we reach the so-called Bear Pit by walking down to Hardwick House and Hardwick Stud and so home. The longer route takes us east to the boundary of the woodland and to the open land beyond with its beautiful views of the Thames and Whitchurch Bridge. We now drop down to the ancient bridleway below, which we follow past Hardwick House and so home.



If we wish, we can then reward ourselves for our efforts by taking some refreshment at the Greyhound.

This will be our second village walk; the Autumn Walk was much enjoyed by the select group that joined in, and we welcome all residents and their guests to participate.
