

FROM THE CHAIRMAN OF THE PARISH COUNCIL

Summer 2018

I am sure that everyone is making the most of this great British summer that we have been blessed with this year and I hope the amazing weather continues.

Even though our Fete is postponed this year, I saw a number of Whitchurch residents at the Whitchurch Hill Fete in May, featuring their infamous egg toss, and the Pangbourne Fete in June. I don't know about you, but for me the dog competition is a highlight. Sarah (a fellow Parish Councillor) and Tim's dog Millie won the coveted top prize! Gill Williamson from the Art Café had a stall for her next project, which will feature Totems on the Pangbourne Meadow. This will happen at the equinox in September. If you haven't made your Terracotta band for the Totem there is still time!

At our June meeting, the Parish Council met with Rachel Grocott, Mel Taylor and Anneliese Kemp who are the organisers of the Whitchurch Pre-School Fete. We agreed with their proposal to move the Fete to the first Bank Holiday Saturday in May from 2019. The reasons for this change are to align the dates better with the school year so that the person organising the Fete will now effectively have a full year to plan, making it a better experience all around. This change also brings the opportunity to expand the Fete going forward. There are discussions of exciting new possibilities such as an evening musical event, and even potentially renaming it into a broader "Festival".

The pre-School parents are also planning a "first" for our village; an Open Air Cinema on the Village Green! This fabulous new event is now pencilled in for Friday the 14th September, so please mark your diary and I am sure we will all look forward to hearing more information.

I was pleased to chair the annual Parish Assembly in May where we had over 30 residents attending to share news about the community activities they are involved in. Our wonderful web-site lists 16 community groups ranging from bell ringers (both tower bell

ringers and hand bell ringing groups) to the Allotments Society to the Flower and Produce shows. This list doesn't include the School, Church, or Football and Cricket clubs that were also in attendance, not to mention the work Graham Dednum of the Ferryboat does at Christmas. We are so lucky to live in a village with such a vibrant community spirit, and I'd like to thank everyone for the great work they are doing, tirelessly organising these activities that help make this a great place to live.

At the Annual Assembly, we received an update from the Bridge Company on their work to address the on going safety issues with the narrow approach road on the Pangbourne side of the bridge. Councillor Hatcher and I subsequently met Geoff Weir to clarify his actions for making this improvement. He confirmed that they have been budgeting for this improvement since the bridge toll increase, but will need the support of the Parish Council and village residents to help with the West Berkshire planning application approval. If you are aware of any safety related incidents on the approach road, you should report them to the Bridge Company so they can use this as part of their application.

I am also pleased to announce that since my election to Parish Council Chairman, John Bradon will now be chairing the Village Plan Steering Committee. John provides an update on the survey results later in the Bulletin, so be sure to read this. There are a number of exciting initiatives coming out of the Village Plan work that we will share in due course, but please be assured that we are aware that the village traffic and parking issues are clearly the number one priority of the residents and the Traffic and Parking Action group (TAPAG) team is making great progress on their work towards recommending solutions.

I look forward to seeing you around and about our beautiful village.

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VILLAGE PLAN SURVEY – INITIAL SUMMARY OF RESULTS

The Village Plan committee want to thank the 144 people who have completed the recent survey. Although this is fewer than answered the last survey in 2008, the mix (by age, location, etc.) is the same so we hope it is representative. We will publish all the results on the village website and the four groups working on the village plan will base their proposals on the respondents' views. The following is a quick summary:

- Traffic – particularly parking and pedestrian safety – is of increasing concern. The Traffic and Pavements working group (TAPAG) are working on range of improvements and it is helpful to know that respondents would support both a 20mph speed limit (90% approve) and also parking restrictions to stop commuters parking all day on the high street. Rachel Hatcher is engaging a consultant to help develop a range of plans and the respondents comments identify further issues to consider, such as the safety of children walking to school on Eastfield Lane.
- People are very pleased with the Village Green and Maze and appreciate the opportunities both for Cricket and Football, for unstructured play and for enjoying being outdoors. 90% of people would like the Maze area to remain an area for picnics and for wildlife. 79% did not want to see further development of the Village Green. Of the 21% who did want some development, many suggested facilities for teenagers, however fewer than 3% of respondents wanted big facilities such as a BMX track or skatepark and this points us towards less-intrusive facilities such as a basketball hoop. By the way, the 2 people suggesting Tennis Courts, could perhaps try Pangbourne Tennis Club who currently really need more members. Sadly, only one person wanted an Amphitheatre.
- There is a desire for of better maintenance of the village environment. 60% are concerned about flash flooding and nearly all want a plan to maintain drainage better so as to reduce the

risk. Support for hanging baskets was limited (22% with some comments strongly against) but people want to see verges repaired and more wildflowers and trees planted. Amongst other things, several people suggested having a group that would regularly maintain open spaces and footpaths.

- Additional access to the river was supported, if this can be arranged. There are lots of canoeists and setting up a club was suggested.
- The Parish Council want, in principle, to replace the Cricket pavilion and also improve the Village Hall (partly as the village would not benefit from selling that piece of land). Currently, different groups are developing proposals and investigating potential grant funding. The survey responses will inform the final choices.
- People would like to see improvements to pavements and the highest priority was to make the area outside the Ferryboat safer for pedestrians. Again, the final choice must take the costs into account and we plan to get estimates.

THE FRIENDS OF ST.MARY'S & ST.JOHN'S

RECENT EVENTS – on 17th June, the Friends organised a 'Discover St Johns' event. This was an open invitation to everyone in the community to explore the inside and the outside of St John's Church at Whitchurch Hill. The church building is not normally open to visit and so this was a chance to see its interesting and elegant interior, largely unchanged since it was built in 1883. The small mortuary building was also opened up for the visitors – it has a beautiful arched ceiling, displaying skilful Victorian craftsmanship.

The event coincided with the national Cherishing Churchyards Week and so The Friends organised an I-Spy nature trail and a Trees ID quiz, to encourage families to explore the large churchyard and enjoy the diversity of flora and fauna. To emphasise the wide variety of plants and animals that can be found there, the results of recent surveys were displayed. Headline figures included 87 plant species, 27 tree species, 17 butterfly species and 34 moth species. Stop and see what you can discover for yourself next time you are passing St Johns! Refreshments were served all afternoon in the Parish Hall and the day was rounded off by a Wine & Cheese Social.

On a practical note, the Friends organised a St.Mary's 'Churchyard work-session' on Saturday 21st April, which was supported by a good team of volunteers. A large amount of debris and prunings etc was produced which was evidence of the hard work that everyone contributed. A similar session is planned to take place at St Johns in September.

FUTURE EVENTS

The Friends continue to host the ArtCafe at the Old Stables on the first Saturday, every other month (July, September, November etc.)

The Friends are also planning a Music Evening at St.Mary's Church for October this year. The actual date is yet to be finalised but it will be notified through a newsletter, Whitchurch website and posters.

The Annual General Meeting will take place in early Autumn when a full update on past /future activities will be discussed. Furthermore, members will be invited to suggest projects and events.

THE POLISH CHURCH GARDEN – AN UPDATE

Since this quiet corner of Whitchurch was transferred to our Parish Council for its management in 2016, many positive improvements have been carried out. It is being transformed from a rather unloved and neglected area to somewhere that can be enjoyed by everyone.

A considerable amount of clearing of debris and over large trees (mostly sycamore) was carried out during 2016 by several working parties and individuals' efforts. Approximately 30 new saplings of native small trees of mixed varieties were planted in Spring 2017 to increase the diversity and to create a small spinney. These young trees are now flourishing, thanks to the dedicated watering by Eileen during their critical first months.

Jon Steward with has helped considerably with various jobs, particularly with mowing some pathways through the longer grass, creating contrasts between long and shorter grasses.

This spring, a big improvement was made when the Council arranged for fencing contractors to replace the old chain link fence on the western boundary with a post and rail fence. Also, the panelled fence on the drive boundary has been repaired and returned to upright by Pete Woolhouse.

An experimental small area of grass has been planted up with plug plants of a meadow mix (grown from seed until large enough to transplant) and additional decorative plants have been added to this area by Doreen. Both Doreen and Eileen have been watering all

these young plants to get them through the drought. It is hoped that this will become a small wild flower meadow, to add to the diversity of plants in the grassy areas.

The Council have ordered a picnic bench which will provide a welcome place to rest and socialise, and enjoy the pleasant surroundings.

Further work is still planned to be done, especially to commemorate the site of the now demolished Polish Church, which was of course an important place of worship for the Polish community after the 2nd World War right up until 1992.

WHITCHURCH BRIDGE – PANGBOURNE APPROACH ROAD

We have so far spent over £30,000 on site investigations and detailed design work on options to widen the Pangbourne approach road, but at the pre-application consultation stage West Berkshire Council (WBC) made it clear that they would need to see evidence of a safety problem that would justify the felling of trees which any widening work would require. They said:

“In the case of this application, where highway safety concerns may be finely balanced against conservation of the setting of a heritage asset it will be important to support a planning application with a soundly reasoned justification in terms of the highway safety rationale for the improvements, including details of the accident record for the site [and] the highway safety concerns that the works seek to address.”

Our safety signage by the footways urges people to take care (avoiding accidents is of course the priority) and also asks that any



accidents or incidents that do occur be reported to us. However, our records of safety-related incidents on our property include no recent accidents on the Pangbourne approach road, so at this time there is no point in submitting a Planning Application as we cannot meet this particular WBC condition.

Although we cannot submit a Planning application at this time – and even if we could, the cost of the works remains a concern – we are proceeding with 2 other schemes to address safety concerns. First, we are in the process of getting a Traffic Regulation Order in place to impose a 20 mph speed limit over the Bridge. Second, after the railings have been repainted we will arrange to keep the vegetation cut back behind them so all the footpath width is usable.

We hope that both schemes will help pedestrians feel safer when walking to and from Pangbourne. Like many other stretches of footway in Pangbourne and Whitchurch our footways are narrow by to-day's standards and care is necessary when using them.

White-Letter Hairstreak Butterfly – an update

We are very pleased to report that Peter Cuss, of Butterfly Conservation, has visited the Maze recently and has spotted one adult butterfly. This means that his prediction that there is a colony on this site was correct. This was based on his discovery of one solitary egg on the bud of the Wych Elm during the winter – amazing! It was extremely difficult to see.

The adult butterflies are rather small and not brightly coloured, and tend to fly high up in the branches of the elm trees. You are much more likely to see them if you use binoculars. Do let us know if you are

lucky enough to see one or more. It would be great to be able to report a sighting with a photograph for the village website.

Peter is now liaising with members of the PAWS group in Pangbourne because they have also been seen flying near elms along The Moors. He hopes to plant one or more resistant elms there too (as was done at the Maze in February).

Haymeadow Walk

This annual event, jointly organised by PAWS and WOTHABS, was held on Sunday 3rd June in the large meadow to the east of Sheepwash Lane, on Hardwick Estate. This was a month earlier than in previous years, and meant that different plants were in flower. It was a great success this year and the weather was warm and sunny. Botanists Sandra Parkinson, Tanya, together with James Norman and Romilly Swann took groups of people on different routes through the meadow after an introductory talk. About 40 people of all ages came along and were able to see an interesting display of various species of grasses and also enjoy refreshments.

James explained that the meadow is rare because it has not been ploughed for about 100 years, or been treated with fertilizers or herbicides. This means that the underlying soil is healthy, well structured, and incredibly species rich. 200 species of plant have been recorded, and these include some that are now very rare in Britain.

River Bank Survey

We are hoping to do the 3rd section of this flora and fauna survey sometime during August. We have surveyed two sections downstream from the bridge, firstly in August 2016 and the second in August 2017. This year, we shall start at the end of Sheepwash Lane and continue downstream until we reach Mapledurham, or run out of time

If you are interested in joining us in our boats, do get in touch with me (whether or not you have a rowing boat or canoe of your own). You need no expert knowledge and it's an enjoyable learning experience for all of us.


