ONLY PATHS AND HORSES

Whitchurch has a small network of footpaths and bridleways. Like all villages these routes are defined in length and position, sometimes in width, and are registered and numbered by the local authority.

We are fortunate that despite only having 12 footpaths (5 of them short or very short) and 4 bridleways and one R.U.P.P. (a road used as public path) most of these can readily be interconnected with those of our neighbouring villages to provide us with the many 'round' walks that we enjoy. We are doubly fortunate in that we also have access to a number of permissive footpaths on Hardwick land and this adds to our route variations and further enjoyment.

Footpaths, in the main, have been in use for centuries and may well be based on the paths used by local workers to get to their places of work who at the end of their working day used another, probably more convenient, path to return home. In doing so they allow us similarly to separate and vary our return routes from our outgoing ones.

But bridleways were used for communication, often over long distances, radiating out without any immediate alternative route for the return. This is obviously irritating to today's leisure horse riders who are frustrated by being unable to locate permissible 'round' rides readily and easily. Unfortunately this frustration on occasion leads them to use the footpath network, this abuse leads to paths that are almost impassable on foot in wet weather and uncomfortable underfoot in dry periods.

Although this is understandable, particularly where a previously safe route for horses is now a main road (Whitchurch Hill or Path Hill for example), such use is not allowed on the defined and registered footpaths and on a permissive footpath network only with the consent of the landowner.

THE JOURNEY BY NICK BRAZIL

Whitchurch AD 430

Naked, featherless and blind, the fledgling flapped his embryonic wings. Lying in the nest amidst the debris of his recent hatching, he opened his beak with an instinctive demand for sustenance. A demand that was soon met by his mother thrusting a beak load of insects down his throat before flying off for more food. Always more food was needed.

Three weeks later, the swallow took flight from the nest. No longer naked and helpless, his body was now covered with a protective sheen of feathers. Out over the tree cover changing from green to autumnal brown, the young swallow twisted,

turned and dived towards the river where the insect swarms were thickest. This knowledge had been imprinted within his brain by the chemicals of instinct passed on by the genes of his parents.

Hundreds of other swallows flitted and dived above the rippling waters snapping up the dancing insects in an instant. Suddenly, a warning as strong as it was indistinct caused the young bird to make an instantaneous break to the left and right as he flitted for the cover and safety of the foliage on the bank. Not a moment too soon as the larger predator, a hobby, its pointed wings swept back, made a lightning dive for him. Missing the young swallow the hobby soon made good with a slightly slower bird. Just as the swallows were frantically preying on the insects in readiness for their imminent journey, the hobbies preyed on them in the ceaseless search for food. Failure by either birds would be repaid by starvation.

Days later the young swallow joined thousands of others migrating south. Flying higher than they had ever done, the flock was driven by a group instinct towards the magnetic warmth of the southern sun. High above, a formation of honking geese overtook them in this annual race for survival.

On the ground below, men fought and killed in their own battles for survival. Smoke from their war and pillage smeared the autumn sky. But the flocks saw nor sensed none of this as ten thousand wings beat on the air. Neither were they aware of the abandoned villas with their torn roofs or the long horned cows turning feral in the absence of their Roman owners.

Travelling down the Channel and into the greyness of a Biscay storm, the flock was thinned as weaker members succumbed and died their frozen bodies falling into the storm flecked sea. But the young swallow lived for he was strong, a natural survivor. Flitting in and out of sleep lasting micro seconds, the swallows crossed the cruelly beautiful white caps of the Pyrenees where countless travellers had perished as did more of their number. But the flock paid them no heed as they flew on into the heat of Iberia and then the Sahara.

Many more would perish over this arid expanse, their lifeless bodies unseen by the passing caravans of camels carrying spices and slaves to the rich markets of the Levant, Greece and Phoenicia.

Finally, the exhausted swallow and his remaining companions arrived at their destination in the Southern African savannah with its vast herds of game from the mighty elephant to the nimble Impala. Here dense clouds of insects danced and swirled over the waters of lakes and rivers. Ample food for the swallows and their new families of demanding chicks. Ample food for the next perilous journey northwards.

Sixteen hundred summers later a distant descendant of that young swallow flew back to the same nesting area by the Thames. Centuries of flood, weather and man had changed the landscape beyond all recognition but this hardy bird knew nothing of this. This was his first return migration to Britain. Instinct took him to the same nesting place where his ancestor had started life. Then it had been beneath the crumbling tiled roof of a deserted Roman villa, now it would be a nest in the shadow of a TV satellite dish.

WHITCHURCH BRIDGE

Our new speed bump and crossing point at the Toll Booth is now in place and we hope this makes it easier to cross the road, particularly for those with buggies and young children. It does NOT give priority to pedestrians, but we expect it to encourage motorists to be more aware of them.

Our engineering consultants Peter Brett Associates have now completed their Report on options to widen the Pangbourne approach road and footway, and between now and February 2017 there will be a period of Pre-Application Consultation: We have put the Report on our website and placed a hard copy in Pangbourne library. We have also written to Whitchurch-on-Thames and Pangbourne Parish Councils with hard copies of the Report inviting comments. We also welcome comments from individuals.

The Company will decide in February 2017 which option to develop further based on the Report's recommendations and the comments received. We will then open discussions with those landowners whose land we would need to acquire, and seek to negotiate agreements for the transfer of land ownership to us subject to Planning Permission

being granted. When we have these agreements in place (and we can only proceed if we get these agreements) we will prepare a Planning Application for submission to West Berkshire Council.

It is unlikely that any works will take place before 2018, and when they do start we will do our best to minimise the extent of any necessary road closures.

Squad training has moved to Wednesday nights to help provide extra opportunities to improve and push the skills on. U9s – *report by Paul Underhay.* Our second season in the RWBL, following a successful first season with a confident group of boys winning silverware. We play against teams from areas with much larger talent pools and punch above our weight. We are adapting to playing 7 a side and, though early days, there are good signs of a lot of potential being unlocked. The boys are keen and talented

and, when they come to terms with the demands of the new format, I'm sure will thrive. We play an attacking brand of football, with the emphasis on teamwork, movement, passing to feet and good finishing.

U11s – *report by Geoff Hardwick.* The U11s have had a great start to the season. We entered a pre-season tournament playing nine a side and offside for the first time. In the group stage they won the first game, lost the next and drew the third which just landed the team into the plate competition. They played a very tight defensive line with some lovely passing and fought their way through to the final which went to penalties. A steady keeper and some very assured shooting earned them a 4-2 win and their first trophy of the season which they celebrated with champagne in true premier league style. The boys are in division 2 of BYDL this year on much bigger pitches (and goals) playing 30mins each half. A PLEASANT STROLL

You and/or your visitors might enjoy a stroll through our neighbouring woods?

Drive up the hill, turn right at the Hatchgate and park alongside the Whitchurch Hill recreation area. Walk towards the village and turn left down Orchard Coombe (this was a delightful cherry orchard). Follow the road round until it turns left towards the main road. As it does you will see a pond opposite on your right and a footpath to the left of it. The pond was the water supply for the cattle kept on this area, which was Whitchurch Common, and the hatchgate was placed to prevent them from leaving the Common.

Follow this narrow path to reach the road to Hill Bottom, turn right and walk down to meet the crossing of the Bridle Road on your right and Gashes Lane on your left. Turn into Gashes Lane and follow this bridleway into Great Oaks Wood. As you enter the wood the path forks, your path is to go left (the right hand one is your return route). Follow this enjoyable broad path through the wood until you reach a 'T' junction, turn left (the path straight ahead is now private); your path is marked shortly afterwards by a single post on your right and will lead you down a narrow track towards the Crays Pond to Goring Heath road (dogs on leads now).

Cross over with care to the broad lane immediately opposite. This is another Eastfield Lane which emerges at the top end of Shervill's Hill in Woodcote. You won't go that far but should follow the wooden fence on your right until the lane starts to bend left and on your right you will see a wooden kissing gate and a dominant footpath sign. Enter the woodland (Little Oaken Wood) here, you will be faced with three paths; take the middle one which has been clearly and splendidly marked and blazed by the Chiltern Society volunteers. Follow these blaze marks straight ahead, do not turn at any of the other marked paths to your left or right. You will meet and go through another wooden kissing gate and again go straight ahead but now down a marked but rather narrower path. You meet and now turn

right onto a broad track (this is the bridle road to Exlade Street).

This track will lead you back to the Crays Pond road again (dogs on leads), cross over with care to the metal gate opposite. Follow this broad road (the many concrete pads hereabouts carried the huts where ammunition was stored during the war). Suddenly the bridle path narrows as it drops off to your left (unmarked) to re-enter Great Oaks, it soon broadens again and will lead you back down Gashes Lane. Cross the Hill Bottom road and go down the Bridle Road opposite to then turn right to return to your car.

You will have walked about 3 miles but you can shorten the walk by parking on the verge near the entrance to Gashes Lane. If you do start from Whitchurch and walk up to the Hatchgate turn it will add another 2 miles.

The impediments (trailers, trees etc.) you have passed en-route were positioned to discourage and prevent access to these areas by Travellers.



