History

The very first WI meeting in the UK took place on 16 September 1915 in North Wales. A century later the world may have changed but the WI is a constant presence.

From humble beginnings the organisation boosted food supplies during both World Wars and actively argued for the supply of adequate sanitary housing. Subsequent campaigns have encompassed such critical issues as Equal Pay, Aids Awareness, Cervical Screening, and Plastic Pollution - to name but a few. In fact, the National Federation of Women's Institute (NFWI) has a history of undertaking educational work and campaigning on a diverse range of issues. It was established to ensure that women are able to take an effective part in their community, to learn together, and together to influence local, national and international affairs on matters most important to members.

Whitchurch Hill WI reflects all of the above. Whether it is through our programme of educational talks, exploring and then voting on issues to be campaigned for at national level, or serving you that most welcome cup of tea at the village fete - everything we do has a purpose.
